At time of writing in early February, we are still awaiting the planning application to build 100 homes on Bengeo Field to be submitted. By the time you read this, the application may well be in and the window to make your objections will be diminishing or even closed.

Waterford Marsh restoration

Major works have commenced early in the New Year at Waterford Marsh to improve the habitat along the Beane. The scheme is a combined project between Hertfordshire County Council and the Environment Agency.

Initially some additional strengthening materials were installed at the breach site by the Horseshoe Weir to protect the adjacent footpath. A team from the EA installed a number of sandbags on 3rd January. Further measures to mitigate the impact of flows around the breach will take place over the coming months.

The main task this winter has been dealing with extensive sections of concrete walls along the Marsh which were collapsing. The walls have been broken up and removed by contractors. Then more natural, sloping banks have replaced the walls and areas with 'brash berms' gradually installed to increase habitat diversity. These are made from woody debris secured within the channel with the use of stakes, some acting as 'deflectors' to help vary flows along the river.

Further plans include removing a small weir upstream and creating further wetland scrapes on the Marsh to hold more water.

History of the Bengeo Community Garden Site

The Garden was the site of the first Bengeo Water Tower, hence the name Tower Street. In 1877 the existing waterworks were not sufficient to supply the growing community and it was decided a Water Tower was needed in addition to the reservoir.

In early 1878 the tenders were put out to build the tower. The lowest tender was Messrs. H Rayment for $\pm 1,960$, and it was paid for by a public works commission loan of $\pm 2,000$.

The tower was built on land leased from Mr Parker of Ware Park for £10.13s.6d per year for a period of 30 years. It was made of brick 37 feet in height with an iron tank on top holding 20,000 gallons. It was supplied by a well, water wheel and pumps from the River Beane at Waterford on land leased from Mr Abel Smith MP.

In October 1878 the system was tested successfully in the presence of Mr T Sheffield and the works were taken off the hands of the contractors and water supplied to the village. It was also around this date that the previously open reservoir at the top of Port Hill was covered over.


By the 1920s the water tower was too small for Bengeo's growing population and a new tower was commissioned and built in 1929 alongside the track that is now The Drive.

The old tower was demolished in 1936 and an ARP shelter and air raid siren were built on the site. No photos have been found of this but it was a simple solid arched structure with a 'blast wall' at the entrance. It stood longways to Tower Street.

Tower Street itself was formed around the same time as the tower was built by Mr Robert Green. It was originally a cul-de-sac put in to lead from Bengeo Street to the Water Tower that was built with access from Duncombe Road. When built it was called Tower Road but it changed its name at various times on various documents.

The tower was occupied by Mr George Roberts whilst he built the houses 10 and 12 Tower Street. He then moved into No. 12 which was next door to the tower and also rented the land around the tower from Hertford Corporation to use as a builder's yard. Later Mr Mansfield lived in No. 12 and rented the grounds as an allotment.

These grounds are now occupied by the bungalows and the garden is the area that the tower itself occupied.



Once the last family left the tower it was used by the local scouts and rented as an electricity substation, its descendant still occupies the ground between the garden and the Parish Hall. Marilyn Taylor



On The Doorstep – Cowslips



The Cowslip, a beautiful yellow flower that as the weather warms and we head into spring, makes an appearance around late March to April. It can quite often be found growing in meadows and the edge of woodland and tends to like dry chalky soil. The cowslip is part of the primrose family, Primula veris. The Cowslip has five bright yellow petals that have a dark orange fleck at the centre. The petals grow out of a long green calyx to form nodding heads that hang in cluster to one

side. The flowers also have an apricot-like smell to them. The stalks are tall and have a downy appearance and the tongue-like leaves are dark green and wrinkled and grow from the base of the plant.

There is also a very similar flower to the Cowslip called the Oxlip, but the Oxlip is guite rare and restricted to certain areas: Cambridgeshire, Suffolk and Essex, although you may spot some in Hertfordshire. The Oxlip has paler petals that are slightly more open and they do not have the orange centre of the Cowslip or the apricot smell, but the flowers also hang in clusters to one side of the plant. Then to make matters even more complicated there is the false Oxlip, which is a hybrid of the Cowslip and Primrose. Like the Oxlip the false Oxlip has a slightly more open flower but like the Cowslip has the orange fleck at the centre. One way of distinguishing the false Oxlip, however, is that the flowers do not hang to one side but splay out in all directions. Whatever you spot they are all equally beautiful and are a pleasure to see.

The Cowslip was a very common flower but between the 1930s and 1980s declined rapidly due to loss of habitat and farming practices. Thankfully in recent years the flower has shown signs of recovery and we are fortunate that Hertfordshire is a county where lots of cowslips have started to reappear.

The flower is the county flower for several counties: Northamptonshire, Worcestershire, Essex and Surrey. It is said to symbolise comeliness and winning grace and used to be scattered on church paths at weddings and put into garlands for May Day. The flower used to be used for sleeping problems, headaches and nervous tension and was made into a tea. The leaves have been used in cooking and are said to have a citrusy flavour and the leaves flavoured English wine.

The name of Cowslips used to be Cow slop due to its association with cow pats, presumably growing out of the ready-made fertilizer, however, over time the name changed to Cowslip. Other names that the Cowslip is known by are Freckled Face, Golden Drops, Bunch of Keys and Fairies Flowers among others. In fact Shakespeare mentions Cowslips several times in his writings, one being in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*:

'The Cowslips tall her pensioner be; In their gold coats spots you see, Those be rubies, fairy favours; In those freckles live their savours, I must go seek some dewdrops here, And hang a pearl in every cowslip's ear.'

'Those be rubies, fairy favours;' are the orange fleck in the flower and it was believed the apricot smell came from them, 'In those freckles live their savours,'

Cowslips are also sometimes known as St Peter's Keys, because of the way the flowers hang in a cluster like a bunch of keys. Legend has it that St Peter was told that a duplicate set of keys to heaven had been made and he let his keys drop and where they fell Cowslips grew. Norse mythology dedicates the plant to Odin's wife Freya, the goddess who held the keys to happiness and love, and in Christianity the flowers have sometimes been dedicated to the Virgin Mary.

Whatever the name, myths or legends the Cowslip is a real spring beauty and definitely a flower that when spotted, cheers the soul and lifts the spirit.

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The cost of living crisis

The fantastic financial donations received from both businesses and individuals have also allowed us to diversify our offerings and we are now able to include a number of fresh food items such as eggs, bread, spread, cheese along with Fruit and Root vegetables with every parcel.

But this year hasn't only been about Food. As gas and electricity prices have soared, we have found that needs for items such as blankets and hot water bottles have increased. Once again, we are grateful to have been able to provide these to those in need and will continue to do so throughout 2023. Unfortunately, the cost-of-living crisis is predicted to worsen throughout 2023 and into 2024, so it is vital that The Hertford & District Foodbank continues to adapt providing support wherever we can.

Goldilocks (Divergent Drama) came to visit their classes and the children helped her role play the story of 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears'.


Foundation stage

Reception have been completing bark rubbings, observational drawings and even did a dragon dance round the fire pit to celebrate Chinese New Year.






KS1


extended our journey up into space on a magical blue balloon. Who knows where our learning will take us next...?

Mice In Maths, we have been exploring the days of the week and months of the year. We have also looked at the four seasons and enjoyed matching objects and pictures to each of them. In literacy, we have been writing a list of objects we would take into space if we were to travel in a rocket. Most of us would like to bring food and a teddy.



Birds In Maths we are looking at different strategies to add and subtract within 20. We have been using bead strings and number bonds. We also went outside to practise our positional language, using our new vocabulary. We have been

investigating wheels and axles in D&T. We are looking forward to making our vehicles!



Hedgehogs We are discovering that we can create a 'fact family' when multiplying and dividing and have been strengthening our knowledge of the two, five and ten times table. In Science, we have set up our own investigations and have been sorting,

naming and labelling different materials and agreeing on their properties.

Squirrels We used paper to create patterns and



understand the technique of weaving. Then we put our learning to the test and used materials to weave through our own wool loom, we had lots of fun!

In Science, we have explored force. As a class, we looked at different

surfaces and how this could create friction. We discussed how the more friction created the more force was needed. We put this to the test and placed a toy car on top of a slope of different materials – wood, fabric, sand, bubble wrap, grass and foam.

Owls In PE, our swimming lessons are proving a big hit – the children were all assessed at the start of the term and are making clear progress already. I'm so impressed with their resilience and stamina.

Reading, English AND History are all based around our topic of Anglo-Saxons and Vikings, which is a rich area we are all enjoying exploring. In music, we are learning the songs for our performance at the Drill Hall in Ware – who knows one of the Owls might end up on the West End stage one day!

Badgers In English, we have been exploring Greek myths and have compared the features between different myths. We have now started to write our own version of Theseus and the Minotaur from the perspective of the Minotaur.

In Maths we have been working hard exploring fractions and decimals – never an easy topic.



Foxes We have been adventuring in the Amazon with our class novel, The Explorer, and learning about climate zones from rainforests to mountains, to polar and to deserts in geography, and compiling mouth-watering Latin American menus in DT. In Maths, the children

have been exploring angles and contemplating coordinates, including plotting starry constellations.

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A Word from The Rectory Snowflake generation

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



Among the many crises we're mired in, there is one that nobody quite wants to own or knows how to solve. That's partly because its causes are so complex, but also because its effects are still unfolding.

The rise in depression, anxiety and suicide among 16–24 year-olds looks like an epidemic after The Epidemic. Statistics outlined by the leading charity Young

Minds are alarming. Suicide was the leading cause of death for males and females aged between five to 34 in 2019. The number of young people referred to mental health services reached a record high last year. Today, one in six children aged five to 16 have been identified as having a probable mental health problem. That's five children in every classroom.

It's a troubling fact that teenagers today are more likely to be depressed than those during The Great Depression and, according to psychologist Peter Gray, since the 1950s things have got better for the old but much worse for the young.

What's going on? In the panicked scramble to answer this question, some blame parents. Some blame teachers. Others (and it's usually older people) blame what is often called The Snowflake Generation.

The term snowflake comes from the book and film Fight Club, which features the line 'You are not special, you are not a beautiful and unique snowflake.' It's since become a putdown for a generation that's seen as over-sensitive and supposedly lacking in resilience.

What generation in history has had to grow up through a technological revolution that, for all its wonders, has brought so many unforeseen deleterious effects: all-day distraction, a fragmentation of concentration, insidious amplified comparison, a relentless 24-hour fight for attention? Answer? None.

This generation is an unwitting guinea pig for something unprecedented. They may not have fought in wars, but I'd say they are in a battle. A largely hidden fight involving the self, the mind, the emotions. To blame them for a mental fragility is to do two things: to ignore the problem and to deny our part in it. As Jeremiah puts it, 'The fathers have eaten sour grapes and the children's teeth are set on edge.'

The English punk band Idles have a song called 'I'm Scum' that makes a virtue of this supposed oversensitivity, defiantly yelling the warning that 'This snowflake's an avalanche' suggesting that this generation may be more resilient than we think, but they'll bury us all unless we face the problem.

Curiously, sensitivity is probably the key. Responses



to this fragility need to be tender as well as urgent; creative as well as practical. Thankfully, charities like Young Minds are bringing together people (of all ages) to improvise hopeful responses, trying to find ways to restore mental health among the young. Solutions that include creative therapies (art, drama and music), dance, mindfulness, technological de-tox, as well as community projects that help young people develop emotional resilience and self-esteem.

A prophet once described a world where parents turned their hearts to their children and children their hearts to their parents. Perhaps it's time to do away with generational demarcation lines. Millennials, Baby Boomers, Generation X. We all need the same things: we all yearn for a sense of worth and health. To be, like snowflakes: special, beautiful and unique.
