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




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Bengeo Neighbourhood Area Plan Update



Safer Streets

As I am sure many of you already heard the community consultation found against the point closure of Byde Street. The margin was significant about 38% in favour and 62% against.

One starting point that all seem agreed on is

to try to stop people from outside the access only area using Byde Street, Wellington Street and Nelson Street as a rat run.

As a Neighbourhood Plan we represent all of the people of the neighbourhood and it has always been our aim to try to reduce traffic throughout the entire neighbourhood.

So, we are continuing our discussions with HCC to try to find solutions and we are not about to give up or campaign any less vigorously because this remains a serious issue that needs to be resolved. One thing that I am very clear about is that simply leaving things as they are is not satisfactory and not an option. We are still discussing traffic calming measures such as raised platforms, better signage and re painting white lines, etc. We are also still debating whether an ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) scheme could be pursued although HCC are not in favour of this measure at present. The Neighbourhood Plan is also keen on discussing ongoing issues on Bengeo Street where traffic is also a significant issue.

We will keep you posted as things develop.

Housing on Bengeo Field between Sacombe Road and Wadesmill Road

As a neighbourhood plan, we oppose housing on this site as it would be contrary to the District Plan and the Neighbourhood Plan as they are currently worded. I encourage as many people as possible to respond to the planning application; we are expecting that it may be put in during late December or early January. See pages 6 and 7.

The Two Brewers

Planning permission has been given to convert The Two Brewers pub into flats for residential use. As the business had not been profitable for some time this seems preferable to the building becoming abandoned and dilapidated.

All of us at the Neighbourhood Plan team wish you a prosperous New Year.

Bengeo Coffee Pot



The latest charity supported by Bengeo Coffee Pot is Hertfood. This is based in Port Vale but encompasses The Hertford Pantry, Help for Ukraine and helping families from local schools. The £1,700 raised by Coffee Pot in the last six months was split equally between Help for Ukraine and Hertfood.

At the time of writing the Hertford Pantry, based in the parade of shops at Sele Farm, has helped 1,900 families, with food donations from local people and from nine supermarkets.

Bengeo Coffee Pot is open to all from 10.30am to 12 noon every Thursday morning, 52 weeks a year, and is run entirely by local volunteers. The café has been in operation for 13 years and has raised over £20,000 for local charities.

Community Campaign to Save Bengeo Field Gathers Pace Credit: BG Drone Shots

A public meeting has taken place to discuss opposition to a proposal to build 100 homes on Bengeo Field. The meeting was called by the Save Bengeo Field campaign group to inform the local community about the planning process, discuss concerns and ask if this proposed application is being made for the benefit of the local community or for profit?



Over 120 people packed the Bengeo Primary School main hall to find out more. Councillors Peter Ruffles and Ben Crystall opened the meeting by explaining the principals of the planning process. Peter Ruffles said afterwards, "The meeting was a valued opportunity for Bengeo Councillors to explain something of the contexts and processes. We've attempted to do that in many letters to correspondents, but the packed meeting was a great chance to do so again and respond to questions."

John Howson, Chair of the Bengeo Neighbourhood Plan steering group, spoke about the 'natural, rolling profile' of the landscape, 'being within easy walking distance to the whole of Bengeo'. He questioned, "you may validly ask why such an attractive amenity would be considered for housing?" He went on to clarify "when the site became part of the HERT4 area and designated for 100 homes, East Herts District Council correctly added the caveat that the homes should only be built subject to the satisfactory previous phased extraction of mineral deposits. So, at the point at which the gravel extraction was rejected by the Public Inquiry in 2019, one may suppose that the question of building houses on the land should also have been ruled out."

Councillor Alex Daar questioned the need for these proposed 100 homes as she revealed East Hertfordshire has delivered more houses than their proposed target by a huge 30%.

Additional speakers covered a number of other concerns for the community including the lack of general infrastructure within the proposal; questioning whether future residents would really walk to the shops on The Avenue and the Co-op to do their shopping? How will traffic in general be affected with additional deliveries and visitors for the new development? How will Bengeo cope with another 100-200 residents' cars when the traffic is already daily seen backed up to the allotments in rush hour? It was pointed out that the area has a terrible rat-run issue which will unfortunately only get worse with more houses. It was argued that the plans for sewerage for the development were insufficient, especially as some Bengeo residents have already sadly experienced the inadequacies of the current sewerage system. A map showed the potential decrease in catchment area for Bengeo Primary, demonstrating that many local families in the future will not be able to get a place at their nearest school and will most likely have to resort to driving their children across town to other schools. The threat to the local environment and ecology was also discussed and mitigations questioned as to their suitability and benefit to our local community.

Closing the meeting, Andrew Stevenson said, "We need responsible planning and what we are getting from East Herts Council administration is irresponsible planning. It shows real incompetence to put in their own document 'gravel has to come first' and then have an executive policy as reported recently in *The Mercury* saying they support the development! More can be added on our infrastructure's deficit and the need for responsible, intelligent planning that puts infrastructure before a blind adherence to numbers that are anyway outdated."

NEXT STEPS: the Save Bengeo Field group are encouraging the local community to be ready to

express their views via the official planning portal when the application is submitted which is expected to be any day now. The window to object will be short, only 21 days, and there is a high chance it will be over the Christmas holiday period. Why not get your email ready now? It is important to remember that it is the number of emails received by the planning team rather than the number of households objecting. Therefore, please ensure that every individual in your household makes their views known via their own email accounts.

We are planning a community fundraiser event held at The White Lion in January, please look out for more publicity and support this event if you can.

We believe the community has some strong arguments against any development of the Bengeo Field but we need everyone to make their views known. If you need any assistance in doing so, please contact us, we are happy to help.






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On The Doorstep – Snowdrops

Firstly, Happy New Year. This year I have decided to write about one or two plants/flowers in more detail, so I thought I would start with the Snowdrop.

The Snowdrop is a pretty delicate white flower that blooms between January and February and despite its delicate appearance is able to survive in some of the harshest weather. The flower gently droops from the stem with six petals, usually three larger on the outside and three smaller creating a bell shape. These petals when turned over have green markings. The plant has two long linear leaves that come from its base and the leaves and stem have (I think), a blueish tinge to them, unlike some of the later flowers that tend to have a bright fresh green.

The scientific name for the Snowdrop is Galanthus nivalis, 'gala' coming from Greek meaning 'milk' and 'nivalis' coming from the Latin 'niveis' meaning snowy. It has been known by several other names including Dew Drops, Eve's Tears and Fair Maids. The plant is also a source of alkaloid galantamine, which is used in the treatment of Alzheimer's.

The Snowdrop is not actually a native of the UK but has been here for centuries, it originates from the Alpine regions and is believed to have been brought over either by the Romans or some monks.

Locally, there are always beautiful displays at Benington Lordship and in St Catherine's churchyard, Sacombe. In fact, many churches have displays of snowdrops, which may explain why the Victorians associated them with death. The Victorians were quite superstitious and believed that if Snowdrops were brought indoors they would bring ill fortune and even death to the family. They also believe that the flowers would turn milk sour and spoil eggs. However, thankfully, other more cheerful symbolic meanings have been attributed to them, such as purity and innocence, probably due to the Snowdrop's white colour; also rebirth and hope, due to it being one of the first flowers to appear in the New Year.

There are also legends about the Snowdrop: one legend says that when Adam and Eve were banished from the sunny, warm Garden of Eden into a cold world, Eve was distraught (presumably why the flowers are sometimes known as Eve's Tears). An angel sent to watch over them, reached down, picked up some snowflakes and blew them, the snowflakes fell and turned into a carpet of Snowdrops. The angel said it was to show that winter would end, the sun would shine again and flowers would bloom, a symbol of hope.

The Snowdrop is a remarkable little flower, beautiful and delicate to look at but with strength to survive in the coldest of weathers and be the first to break through to herald the spring and the hope of better, warmer weather.

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
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

In October Save Beane Marshes won the CPRE Hertfordshire award for Saving and Protecting the Countryside together with the CPRE Gold Standard Award. The CPRE Hertfordshire Awards celebrate the achievements of individuals and groups who have worked to protect, promote and enhance the countryside for the benefit of their local population.

The award was for raising above £100,000 for the preservation of the Beane Marshes and we received an additional £30,000 from Hertford Town Council.

This allowed the marshes to be purchased by Hertford and Middlesex Wildlife Trust for the preservation of wildlife and for the local community.

Hannah Lilley of Save Beane Marshes said: 'It was a fantastic privilege to receive this award and it is testimony to the amazing generosity and hard work of the local community. We'd like to thank everyone involved for all their hard work.'

Mill Mead Primary School



Ducklings. Nursery took part in the whole school project, learning about The Gunpowder Plot. They fully immersed themselves in acting out the plot and creating their artwork.

We were lucky to have a professional drama company come and do a

workshop with our class, and the children went back in time to search for Guy Fawkes himself. They used this inspiration to create an impression of his face, using natural resources and they made a life-sized Guy. The children enjoyed the project and were very proud to show off their splatter fire-work art at the exhibition.



Mice. We have been very busy making props for our new toy workshop in the role play area. We are using this to explore many of the things we have been learning about in maths and phonics. We have a wrapping station to explore 3D shapes and lots

of opportunities to write instructions, toy lists and labels. We had a great time making decorations for the rest of the school. We made candy canes from recycled paper and Christmas puddings from paint and old cotton wool.

Birds. In Mathematics we have been adding and subtracting numbers within 20. We have been practising using different strategies such as number lines and 'make ten'. In English we have been learning about poetry. We learnt a poem called '*Down behind the dustbins*' by Michael Rosen. We changed the name of the dog, found our own rhyming words and then wrote our own line. In D&T, we learnt how windmills worked and then made our own. We loved wearing pyjamas to school for Children in Need Day.

Hedgehogs. In Maths, we have covered a number of topics including adding and subtracting 2-digit numbers, measuring in metres and centimetres and now we are looking at statistics with pictograms and bar graphs. We really enjoyed taking our maths outside to see what we could measure with a metre stick.

Squirrels. In Art, we have been exploring craft and using different materials to learn about new artistic skills. So far, we have practised paper weaving, fabric weaving, mood board making and tie dye! We have used all of our new skills to create amazing art pieces.





Owls. We have developed Geography skills learning about modern Egypt. We have explored circuits in Science and learnt about how to make the most of our character strengths in our My Happy Mind sessions.

Badgers. Year 5 have thoroughly enjoyed our new text in English: Shackleton's Journey. We have taken part in expedition interviews – the children pretended to be Shackleton and interviewed 'applicants' for the journey.

We have also had fun in Music as we have been learning the melody for 'Somewhere over the rainbow' on the xylophones.



Foxes. Year 6 are riding high following their jawdroppingly brilliant performance of *The Tempest* at the Shakespeare Schools Festival. Our stellar cast took to the stage at London's Arts Depot

A Word from The Rectory Multifaith monarch

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



The day was 27th January 2005, the 60th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, the place was St James's Palace, with the then Chief Rabbi Jonathan Sacks in attendance. Her Majesty the Queen was meeting a group of Holocaust survivors.

Royalty arrives on time and leaves on time, and so it always was with the Queen, but not on this occasion. When the time

came for her to leave, she stayed. And stayed. And stayed.

One of her attendants said that he had never known her to linger so long after her scheduled departure. She gave each survivor – and it was a large group – her focused, unhurried attention. She stood with each until they had finished telling their personal story.

It was an act of kindness that almost had the Chief Rabbi in tears. One after another, the survivors came to him in a kind of trance, saying: 'Sixty years ago I did not know if I would be alive tomorrow, and here I am today talking to the Queen.' It brought a kind of blessed closure into deeply lacerated lives.

Why tell this story today? In 2023 a new multifaith monarch will be crowned. And there's every indication that the Queen's attentiveness to religion and people of faith will continue under Charles, not just as a constitutional obligation but as a personal engagement.


He will hold the title Defender of The Faith, despite floating the idea in 1994 that it should be simply Defender of Faith. But there's little doubt that the title will be all-encompassing. No one does interfaith better than the Royal Family, and that started with the Queen herself.

From the first year of her reign in 1952 she was

patron of the Council of Christians and Jews, the organisation founded by the Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, and the Chief Rabbi, Joseph Hertz, in one of history's darkest nights ten years earlier.

Only ten years ago at her Diamond Jubilee, the Queen met at Lambeth Palace leaders of the nine leading faiths in Britain: Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Hindu, Sikh, Buddhist, Jain, Zoroastrian and Bahai. Each showed her an object that held special significance for them. In return she praised their contributions to the nation.

They helped the sick, the elderly, the lonely and the disadvantaged. More and more, she said, the Church of England was actively co-operating with other faiths to build a better society. Faith, and not just Christian faith, reminds us of 'the responsibilities we have beyond ourselves.'



In his sermon at the state funeral for the Queen last September the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said of the new king, 'I know His Majesty shares the same faith and hope in Jesus Christ as his mother; the same sense of service and duty.'

True, but. he inherits the throne of a United Kingdom transformed into a multi-ethnic, multifaith society. Royal recognition of the significance of interfaith work has given it a prestige it would not otherwise have had, helping to make tolerance the default option in British life today.

To see the royal family lighting Hanukah candles with children at a Jewish school or being adorned with flowers by appreciative Sikhs at a Gudwara, or visiting a Hindu temple for Diwali, is to see royalty at its best. No one would doubt the duty of a monarch to defend the Established Church, but no one would doubt the importance of faith to any monarch who understands how important other faiths are for their adherents.

Defending the Faith will mean continuing that inclusive, hospitable witness to religion that the royal family have adopted in public affairs. It will mean promoting respect, tolerance and inclusivity – great unifying forces – a unity we will need, the more diverse religiously and culturally we become.

It will mean taking time to listen to the many voices of multi-faith Britain, following the faith that so sustains their personal story.
