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

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

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The Bengeo Neighbourhood Area Plan was adopted in 2021 and from that time the BNAP Steering Committee have continued to meet to discuss local planning applications. Currently the second phase of the

development on Bengeo Field and the creation of local projects such as the Bengeo Community Garden on Duncombe Road. Now it has been decided that the committee should transition to become the Love Bengeo Community Group and place more focus on new local projects.

John Howson has chosen to step-down as Chair and I would like to express our thanks for the hard work and dedication John has shown steering the BNAP through its many stages

Our new projects include continuing to develop the Bengeo Community Garden, creating a walking trail, and Bengeo Cycling Routes for those that take their exercise on two wheels. The walking trail will take in some of the most interesting and historic sites in Bengeo possibly including online information at specific sites accessed by a QR code.

We will continue to try to resolve the traffic problems in Lower Bengeo and preserve the former railway land as a green space and possible walking or cycling path.

Whilst it is very disappointing that East Herts District Council Planning Committee decided to approve the application for the second phase of building 118 homes on Bengeo Field, throwing the area into years of construction chaos and destroying a highly valued unique landscape, we will now try to engage positively with Durkan to get the best possible buildings and green spaces in the development.

If you have any ideas how you would like Bengeo to become an even better place to live or if you are able to contribute to the new projects, please come along to a meeting, they are all open to the public. We meet once every three months and the next meeting is on Monday 27th January 2025 at 7pm at the Bengeo Club.

# **On The Doorstep – Common Daisy**



The lovely Common Daisy is a much-overlooked and indeed, trampled on, little flower. It is a delicate but hardy beauty and can be seen pretty much all year round. I have even seen it poking out through snow. The Daisy is a member of the Asteraceae family which is one of the largest flower families. The Common Daisy is a low growing plant that can be found in many lawns and grassy areas. It is a native of Europe and can be found as far north as the Faroe Islands. It is widespread and naturalised in most temperate regions including the Americas and Australasia.

The flower has a rosette of small rounded, spoonshaped leaves that grow flat to the ground. The plant sends out rhizomes, which then send out shoots, which means that the plant can colonise large areas. The stalk is hairy with no leaves and can grow to around 20cm in height with a single flower at the end. The flower is actually not one flower head but many, the flower is made up of hundreds of tiny yellow flowers (florets), surrounded by a disc

Each tiny floret has its own stigma and stamen. The flowers are held on a bract, a leaf structure. The yellow flowers in the centre are actually in a spiral pattern.

The Daisy is visited by many insects including Hoverfly, honey bee and bumble bee. However, the insects that are probably the Daisy's best pollinators are the thrip and small beetles.

The plant displays heliotropism, which means that the flowers follow the position of the sun. The flowers also close at night and open in the day. This is possibly where the name Daisy originates from as the flower was known as 'day's eye'. In fact, Chaucer mentions the Daisy calling it 'eye of the day'. The flower has also been known as Bruisewort and its Latin name is Bellis Perennis, Bellis probably from the Latin Bellus meaning pretty and *perennis* meaning everlasting.

The Daisy has been used since ancient times as an herbal remedy. The Egyptians grew them and used them to help ease stomach ulcer, gout and fever and you can still see herbal teas using daisies in them. The young leaves have been used in salads and can also be cooked.

The Daisy is synonymous with innocence and youth, evoking memories of making Daisy chains and playing 'loves me loves me not' whilst pulling off the petals and no impromptu posy making for your Mum was ever complete without a few wilting Daisies in it. So, it is no surprise that the Daisy symbolises innocence and purity and, of course, there are many legends about the delicate flower. There is a Celtic legend that said when an infant died God would sprinkle daisies over the land as a sympathy flower. In Norse mythology the Daisy is known as the sacred flower of the Goddess Freya, who was the Goddess of love, beauty and fertility, so a flower for motherhood and new beginnings.

Of course, Daisies have been written about in literature and in many poems over the years, but seeing as January is the month that Robert Burns is celebrated, I will end here with little extract from a poem by him:

*"Now nature hangs her mantle green, On every blooming tree, And spreads her sheet o'daisies white, Out o'er the grassy lea."* 

From 'Lament of Mary, Queen of Scots, On the Approach of Spring.'

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

### Ghosts by Henrik Ibsen 7th–15th February 2025 at 7.45pm Matinee on 8th February at 2:30pm

*"We may even be ghosts ourselves. I look out there – everywhere there are spirits – everywhere – in numbers like grains of sand. And we're all – all of us – so pathetically afraid of the light."* 

Helen Alving is preparing to open an orphanage in memory of her late husband when her son Osvald returns home after many years abroad. As she begins to feel the presence of ghosts from the past, he discovers that there is more to his mystery illness than he first thought. Long-hidden secrets unravel and his father's legacies emerge – only by uncovering the truth can they both be set free.

Ghosts is the most accomplished play of Ibsen's middle period, in a sparse, tense version by Mike Poulton that crackles with energy. Like a thriller, the revelations rise to fever pitch. Characters tell truths, half-truths, lies – conscious and unconscious – and there are ghosts everywhere.

# Remembering Guy Horlock – 1929 to 2024



Guy was born at home in Slough 16th June 1929, but shortly after moved to Beckenham in Kent. The first child of 'older' parents, Guy was constantly getting into trouble.

Life changed dramatically for him at the age of 10 when war was declared. Guy and his brother Roger were evacuated to their

cousins in the Cotswolds. Initially he worked on the farms and delivered milk, helped with the harvest, stooking grain and gathering in crops to the barns. He loved it. School unfortunately wasn't as successful and he was moved back to Windsor in order to go to St George's School Windsor Castle and then Dulwich College. Shortly after this the family moved to his beloved Margate.

1947 saw Guy proudly joining the elite 42 Commando Royal Marines as part of his National Service. Alongside winning many of the top cadet awards, he went to Lympstone, St Ives, Plymouth, Malta, Gibraltar, Tripoli gun running to Palestine and ended with defending the Suez Canal. It was on his way home that he managed to catch chicken pox. His temperature went up and his hair fell out. It never recovered!

Returning to the UK he trained as a brewer and got a job as a chemist at the local maltings firm in Stanstead Abbotts – French and Jupps. 62 years later he retired as chairman!

An old chicken farm came up for sale on The Avenue in Bengeo. Borrowing his Dutch friend's house plans, 'Fireflies' was designed. It took a year to build, and whilst working full time he learnt as he went along. Always one for a deal, he used the house as a demonstration for a new type of plastic damp course. The bricks were second-hand bricks from old maltings being pulled down in Ware. Meeting Jenny in Cambridge in March 1967, getting engaged in the September and then marrying her here at Holy Trinity 6 weeks later, the man who said he would never get married had finally settled down! Then went on to have three children.

Bengeo was his home. He threw himself into village life. As church warden, where he was the instigator in having St Leonard's re-consecrated for weddings, a PCC member for many years, one of the Summer Fete organisers and stained-glass window benefactor, Holy Trinity was at the heart of his faith and beliefs.

Eventually his health started to deteriorate due to his Parkinsons and the decision was made to finally leave Fireflies after 55 years and move into 'Dial House'. He amazed us all by driving himself on his mobility scooter round to the new house with barely a look back. He was ready for his new adventure.

Guy's attitude to life was live it to the full. His father's advice to him when he joined the marines was 'take every opportunity you are given, they won't ask you twice!' It was the mantra he lived by and passed onto the next generation as well.

He died peacefully in the late hours of 25th August 2024.

Reception have been up to a lot since half term. We started the term with our whole school Rebellion Project. We were very busy preparing for the Christmas Nativity.





### A Word from The Rectory Hope: The shape of things to come

#### From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



'Happy New Year' I wished someone in the street the other day, only to get a grunt in return. 'Hope so,' they said, and strode past.

Fair enough – it was an honest answer to an honest question. Oftentimes, our best wish for a new year is to hope that it will be better than the last one.

That won't be difficult. The reviews of 2024 have already set the bar

of expectation low – their annual account of war, economic crisis, social disease and climate catastrophe would make the four Horsemen of the Apocalypse blanch and turn tail.

To summarise: The end of the world is well-nigh. Things are going to get worse. Warmer. Poorer. More divided. The general tenor is 'be afraid, be very afraid.'Where once a new year would see us recklessly braving resolutions, a collective neophobia has descended.

But are we living in the end of days? Are these the worst of times? Or are these the projections – even the ambitions – of middle-aged men like me? I'm old enough to see that things are bad, but I'm also ugly enough to remember worse. I also know that fear sells. Sells papers, votes and products.

It feels as if the pedlars of fear have been buying all the airtime and ad space for far too long, encouraging people who already feel threatened to see threats everywhere. It's dangerous. Stimulating fear in people and then making it sound like wisdom, faith or patriotism makes fear a resolution.

Scouring the internet seeking better stories, I struck Google gold with news on the burgeoning medical revolution of recent times. So bless you Bertalan Meskó, director of the Medical Futurist Institute in Budapest, for leading a chorus of voices hailing a new 'golden age' of medicine – thanks, in part, to Covid-19.

'Breakthroughs in mRNA technology first applied in Covid vaccines could soon help eradicate certain types of cancer,' he said. 'Then there's the huge potential of Ai and 3D printing and, most excitingly, advances in genomics, which will unlock the genetic bases of many diseases, leading to new and more targeted treatments.'

'It's an amazing time,' he added. 'I feel lucky to be living through it.'

Which is enough to put a smile on my face under a runny nose and winter snuffles.

We need to hear that kind of voice right now. The voice of hope. Rather than being a luxury we can't afford, hope is an essential, even necessary, part of being human. We are these extraordinary creatures able to make great leaps of imagination and faith. We can dare imagine a better year ahead and then dare play our part in bringing it about.

Let's not write off this future before it has arrived. Scripture says God promises us a future. 'For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope.' It's freely given. We just have to say yes to it.
