

Bengeo Cricket Club – a success story

The Club has a proud history dating back to 1875 and has experienced somewhat of a renaissance over the last nine years or so having nearly folded as a club in 2015. This is

due to a lot of hard work behind the scenes and grants to support the club's development. The commitment from the club members, many of whom are Bengeo residents is inspiring. They volunteer, for free to coach Junior Programmes or, give up time to keep the ground in good condition over the summer months.

Club Secretary Neil O'Toole explains how this all started, "In 2015 we came close to folding as a club, through lack of players and members. A small band of club members set about stabilising and rebuilding the club. Back then the club had one Saturday team (just) and struggled to get players on a Sunday for friendlies. It was decided that the best way to make the club sustainable and to grow was to build the Colts, the Junior section, and start from scratch. This was a daunting prospect, so we took on the ECB (English Cricket Board) National Programmes of Dynamos (7 to 11 years) and All Stars (4 to 7 year olds). We have done that for the last 5 years. We now have four Colts teams ranging from Under 9s to under 13 year olds and we'll keep building that up. It is a big commitment, and a lot of time goes into running the club, we have at least fifteen volunteers supporting the Sunday morning sessions and thankfully an active committee who get things done. When you see the ground on a Sunday morning there are in excess of 100

youngsters playing cricket and being active, it's very rewarding. The majority of youngsters come from the Bengeo catchment, especially Bengeo Schools and some from further afield. We are the third highest ECB-subscribed programme in Hertfordshire, so we beat a lot of the bigger towns, which is a fantastic effort by the Club, being a smaller local team. We see this as a community asset and we have now made the club sustainable."

Neil adds, "The success of the junior section is also reflected in the senior Club teams. The first team have won their league twice and secured a promotion to the Premier Division of the Herts and Essex Border League in recent years. For the first time in 25 years we now have a 2nd XI Team, who play in the Hertfordshire Saracens League, with many of the players coming from the Colts and Dynamos programme the club have been running. Again, it's fantastic to see the youngsters develop and grow into senior players. We also offer a Sunday friendly team, (ideal for those wanting to get into or back into cricket). A recent highlight was fielding a Sunday team with an average age of 14 who performed incredibly well, this would have been a distant thought a few years back."

"The club has aspired to make cricket a more inclusive and accessible sport by being friendly and family orientated. It has been a real success story here over the last few years. One of our next milestones will be to have a Girls' Colts Team, the numbers of girls getting involved increases every year and we'd be delighted to support more female

cricket participation at the club and get more people hooked and involved with the game."

Neil goes on to say, "The club has a huge asset in the cricket field and facilities at the ground, which is also shared with Bengeo Trinity FC. We were very fortunate that the Town Council gave us a grant towards the new ECB-approved training nets with two wickets with run-up and approaches. It is a big investment and has provided us with real benefits, we can now train away from the cricket wicket in all weathers with a modern first-class facility."

Neil says, "It's a great team effort to keep the club running. We are grateful to our members, Committee and volunteers, not only the coaches who give up their time, but the bar staff, grounds people and parents who come and support us. It's a real community effort and one we're incredibly proud of. It would be fantastic to see more local support and people getting involved with the Club, and there's a bar in the clubhouse too, if extra encouragement is needed!"

Next year is Bengeo Cricket Club's 150th anniversary from its beginnings in 1875 so watch out for events to mark the centenary and charity fundraiser, (a walk from the Ground to Lords Cricket Stadium!). www.bengeocricketclub.hitscricket.com.





On the Doorstep – July to August 2024

Common Bird's-foot Trefoil, this is a rather wonderful yellow flower that is native to Europe and can be seen flowering between June and September. The plant is part of the pea family and grows to around 35cm in height, taller if supported. The flower has five petals, one that covers the stamen, etc with two that surround this and then one slightly larger which acts as a land platform for insects, like many legume plant flowers. The plant has five leaflets, two growing out directly from the stalk and then three in a group that grow on a stem a little higher than the two at the stalk. The group of three leaves giving rise to the plant's common name trefoil.

The flowers appear in small clusters at the top of the stem and have the appearance of soft slippers. Bird's-foot Trefoil is a tough little plant that favours well drained soil, but can be found growing in many places, grassland, moors, heaths, rocky habitat, along the side of paths and roadsides. The plant can withstand mowing, grazing, and trampling. Locally it can be found in abundance at Waterford Heath growing in the short grass, creating a glorious carpet of yellow.

Its scientific name is Lotus Corniculatus but it is known by many other common names, in fact it has been attributed over 70 different common names, a popular little plant. Some of the many common names for it are: Butter and Eggs, Eggs and Bacon, Hens and Chickens, probably in reference to the wonderful rich egg yolk yellow of the flowers, which have orangey/red buds and the flowers themselves can be tinged with an orangey/red. Another not so attractive name is Granny's Toenails, in reference to the seed pod shape, which is also why it is called Bird's-foot because of the claw-like seed pods. Some other fascinating names are Cheesecake Grass, Ground Honeysuckle and God Almighty's Thumb and Fingers.

Bird's-foot Trefoil is an important food source for the caterpillars of several butterflies including Common Blue, Silver Studded Blue and Diggy Skipper amongst others. It is a good source of nectar for many other insects. The plant can and has been used as a forage plant for livestock, for silage and hay. Not only that but the plant is good for the soil due to its ability to 'fix' nitrogen, a process of

converting atmospheric initrogen into ammonia, improving soil fertility.

In the past the plant has been used for various medical ailments, the seed pods and flower were used in small amounts as a sedative, for the nervous and cardiac systems, as well as for anxiety, insomnia and exhaustion. However, the plant contains hydrogen cyanide, so not a good idea to be ingested by humans.

In the Victorian Language of Flowers, it was said to symbolise revenge, maybe connected to the fact that the plant contains hydrogen cyanide. In pagan times it was thought the plant offered protection and was woven into headdress for summer festivals. When Christianity was embraced the plant became associated with the Holy Trinity because of the group of three leaves together. However, the protection theme remained as children use to name the plant 'No Blame' as it was believed that if picked it would make you immune to punishment, or the wrath of your teacher. Wishful thinking there!

This tough little plant is a winner for me, I love its glowing colours, soft shaped flowers and its many fascinating common names, if you're out and about keep a look out for it.





The reredos, the decorative screen at the back of the altar at the east end of Holy Trinity church, had become dirty over the years since its installation around 1885 and some of the

figures had been damaged. The reredos was erected as a result of a donation from Robert Smith of Goldings, who was a great benefactor to the church. The figurative scenes on the reredos plaque were sculpted in terracotta by George Tinworth. Matthew Beesley, conservator, carried out the cleaning and restoration of the reredos following a generous donation from Libby and Peter Shillito in memory of their son, Tim.

Reredos materials

The main part of the screen is composed of Caen stone from Normandy. This stone is particularly absorbent and tends to retain the dirt more than other types of limestone. Bathstone was also used: the honey-ochre coloured Hartham Park for the supporting structures to the reredos and font and the six corbel heads of the chancel; a lighter Stoke Ground for the cupolas, croquettes, finials and tracery, figures and spandrels, as well as the carved detailing to the font. The darker pillars, colonettes, on either side of the central plaque are composed of granite stone.

George Tinworth of the Doulton factory in Lambeth created the three plaques using terracotta. The left-hand plaque shows Christ meeting a woman, the right plaque is Christ meeting Mary after the crucifixion and the central plaque represents loaves and fishes. Tinworth added successive and contrasting coloured slips to develop two- and three-dimensional visual space which enhanced the

sculptures through exposing underlying layers. Cleaning has revealed this two-tone effect and has brought the central Christ figure into prominence. George Tinworth created more plaques for churches in this country and abroad.

Cleaning the stone and panels

In terms of cleaning, the conservator, Matthew Beesley, used 5 different chelating agents and rinses which are used in conservation for paper, parchment, textiles and ceramics/stone/marble. He started at the top left of the reredos and worked gradually downwards and across. In some places



open joints had developed and where condensation had caused moisture runoffs which produced a weak acid eating into the limestone. These joints were later filled. The four text panels were composed of a more porous terracotta, and so these were cleaned with acid-free

paper pulp poultices to extract the subsurface dirt, rather than risking pushing the dirt in solution deeper into the body of the panels. The initial cleaning used a biodegradable emulsifier as a wetting agent for oil-water dispersions across surfaces, enabling simpler rinsing methods.

The results of the conservation speak for themselves as cleaning and restoration brings out the intricacies of the modelling and carving and allows us to appreciate the fine detailing. We are fortunate to have such splendid workmanship in our church.

About Matthew Beesley

Matthew is an Accredited Conservator with the Institute of Conservation, and a member of the International Institute of Conservation. He works on both secular and ecclesiastical architecture, private collections, monuments, wall paintings, and objects from European, Asian, and Far Eastern cultures from circa 5,000 years ago through to the Post-Modern period, including many UK Cathedrals, museums, working occasionally on the Allied Forces monuments in Normandy, and other objects in several European countries. He regularly works on Egyptian, Greek, and Roman statuary, through to

annual recurring projects such as Anthony Gormley's and other contemporary sculpture.

After studying Fine Art Painting and Printmaking at Byam Shaw School of Art, London, (mid-late 1970s) followed by a traditional training in masonry, carving, and letter carving, continuing his apprenticeship at Cologne Cathedral over two years, he returned to England. He founded a ceramics and pottery class for the blind, teaching for four years voluntarily in Northampton, and engaged as an art therapist in the community and psychiatric hospitals, also voluntarily.

Early in his conservation career he formed a tenperson team of international architects and conservators to complete the conservation (all internal and external elevations) of Henry VII's Chapel, Westminster Abbey, over a four-year period. Upon completion of the project, He met Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip, and his name was subsequently incorporated into the new stained-glass window in Henry VII's Chapel designed by Alfred Fisher as a celebration of the project's completion, 1995. At the same time, he managed a team to conserve 275 monuments inside the Church of St Helen, Bishopsgate, sheared from walls and damaged by the Liverpool Street Station bombing by the IRA. In 2008, his conservation studio was visited by the then Charles, Prince of Wales, to discuss conservation being carried out on firedamaged neo-classical marble statuary.

Matthew was also senior conservator at Chichester and Llandaff Cathedrals for several years (1994–1999).


Adult Education Course September 2024




County Hockey Tournament 23rd May


We love seeing our children enjoy new experiences. They have taken part in lots of activities around Easter plus some exciting challenges and trips.



Owls: learned about food waste, food miles and where our food comes from – and were shocked at how much food is wasted and what that equates to in terms of cash! In Maths they solved all sorts of real-world problems relating to length, capacity and mass. In Science, they

have been learning about how scientists group living things, creating our own questions for classification keys.

Badgers: have been learning different tennis strokes in PE and taking part in Science investigations based on forces, such as water resistance, air resistance, and friction. In D&T they designed labels for a spaghetti Bolognese packaging project.

Foxes: SATS week was rounded off in traditional Mill Mead style with an epic water fight and pizza feast on the school field. Back at work they have been busy dreaming up some amazing holiday itineraries during our maths budget challenge.

A Word from The Rectory

Mixed messages: a mixed blessing

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



In elections across the world, it seems voters are having to develop supernatural levels of insight in order to choose the right kind of person for a particular office. Not because politicians are suddenly of a lower standard than before: but because in a world of carefully tailored messages, it's becoming harder to know what a person really stands for based on what they say.

Mixed signals accompanied the general election campaign from the very start with the prime minister announcing polling day standing in a rain shower in his shirt sleeves – a leader with a plan for everything, apart, apparently, from the famous London weather. The picture of Rishi Sunak standing there in his soaking wet jacket could become a defining image with the electorate left to decide a caption for it. 'Braving the political storm?' 'Things Can Only Get Wetter?'

This is an age-old problem for politicians – good and bad – constantly having to check their 'optics' and their words; negotiating a complex balance between expressing what they think and what they think most people want to see and hear. It is possible and it should be possible for politicians to express what they believe and for us to believe them, but it says something that, even in democracies where people are free to say what they want, some still seem afraid to do so.

If so, this is a spiritual as well as political problem. We end up creating a system that favours people-pleasers who say things they don't really mean in order to gain power over those who really have something to say and mean it. A kind of 'he who flatters wins' situation. Such a system ends up diluting substance and feeding us soundbites and

presentation. By the time the words are filtered through the media, the gap between appearance and reality is often so distorted it's hard to discern what's true.

Woodie Guthrie once wrote a song with the lyric, 'Jesus Christ For President,' but I doubt Jesus would fare any better at the hustings. It's said he didn't look great; he often said provocative things to the wrong people at exactly the wrong time; he hung around with people of little consequence, delivered a very off-putting and baffling manifesto, and had a kind of anti-spin approach to public relations. His campaign ended not in election to high office, but in crucifixion.

Yet the man who turned down the offer of earthly power and who was despised and rejected by many, got his message through all the same. He has more followers today than any head of state. Millions of people can still quote his manifesto and some even try and implement his policies.

Jesus once said, 'Woe to you when all men think well of you.' Good advice perhaps for those politicians seeking popularity at the expense of character, power at the price of principle.

So here's a truism for politicians of every political stripe: if you want your message to stick, say what you mean, and mean what you say – but don't expect people to love you for it.

Hertford Pantry

The Holy Trinity Church Lent Appeal was for a home-grown charity this time. The Hertford Pantry has been running for almost 2 years and benefits people in Sele Farm. It is different from the main Food Banks in Hertford as it distributes fresh food. Deborah Bonfield, who set up the charity, says: "We collect food at the end of each day from local supermarkets through the Fare Share food platform and store it overnight then we distribute across 3 sessions a week at our hub in Fleming Crescent, Sele Farm"

The hub is open to all, so anyone can attend and take food that would otherwise be destined for landfill. There is no criteria or referral to collect food from Hertford Pantry – anyone can come. As well as fresh food there are extras that we have purchased plus dried goods that are given to people that need a bit more help.

The sessions are held on Mondays from 1pm to 2pm, Wednesdays 1.30pm to 2.30pm and Saturdays from 11am to noon. On average there are around 80 families per session attending plus they do a certain number of deliveries per week

The pantry is run purely by volunteers and is a registered charity number 1208168. The Holy Trinity Lent Appeal raised nearly £1,000 for the charity.




