Hertford and District Churches Together

HDCT is an organisation that includes Hertford Town and surrounding village churches of all denominations. It is a demonstration of all Christian churches, congregations and volunteers working together encouraging one another and, drawing on a wide skill set and resources, to serve the communities in and around Hertford. All this is in addition to the valuable work being done by churches in the area. The groups that are currently supported by HDCT include:

Young Life Hertford has offices and YL meetings in the Cowbridge Rooms, with thanks to the URC. YL take school assemblies in secondary schools in Hertford and Ware and are developing lunchtime groups. YL run an after-school club in St Andrew's School: 'Toastie Tuesday' for years 7–11 to drop in and chat.

Faith in Print. Books and media given to local schools to aid teaching about faith.

FutureHope use the Pioneer Hall at the Methodist Church in Ware Road seeing 20 to 30 people attending their drop-in café on Wednesdays and mentoring teenagers and parents in separate groups. FutureHope also run drug awareness courses in local schools and use a converted mobile library as a hub for youth outreach work especially on Hartham Car Park on a Friday evening.

Hertford and Ware Street Pastors. Hertford and Ware have small teams that work in the town centres Friday and Saturday evenings. Teams are trained by Street Pastors, a national organisation that liaises with local councils, church groups and police authorities.

Hertford Wellbeing Church and the Town Church had recently campaigned on the streets of Hertford in support of Pro-Life issues. Even if they were not always met with agreement, it did at least provide a starting point for discussion with members of the public. The Friday night video games and pizza night is still popular with young adults and the Wellbeing Church now has two football teams.

Service for the World Day of Prayer. This will be held on 1st March at the Baptist Church for prayer from 3–4pm and 8–9pm and vigil and silence in between those times. Refreshments at 4pm and tea and coffee all day. The focus will be on praying for the Middle East.



Hertford and District Foodbank. Local schools are very supportive, providing donations especially at Harvest and Christmas. Although donations of food are always welcome, look out for the monthly shopping list. The Foodbank is hosted by the URC in the Cowbridge rooms.

Good Friday Walk of Witness 10am starting at the Methodist Church then on to the Friends Meeting House, for a prayer and a song or two, then on to URC Cowbridge Halls for refreshments.

Daily Prayer for the Earth. For a year, from 1st January 2024, a group of Hertford residents are meeting daily in Hertford's Salisbury Square at 12 noon. They read a prayer or a poem from different parts of the world and spiritual traditions, followed by a short period of silent reflection.





Spring is here and so the Wood Anemone is my flower of choice this time. The Wood Anemone is a ground covering plant, with a pretty star like flower, approximately 2cm across and on a long stem. It usually has six or seven white petals, although they can sometimes be found with a pinkish tone to them as well. The leaves of the plant come from the base and are, I think, as attractive as the flower, they have three lobes, each lobe being divided. The plant grows between 5cm and 15cm in height.

The Wood Anemone is part of the Buttercup family and its scientific name is Anemone Nemorosa, anemone comes from Greek and means 'daughter of the wind', and in fact one of the common names for the flower is Windflower, some say this comes from the myth that the Greek god of wind Anemos, sent the flowers ahead of him to herald his coming. Nemorosa comes from the Latin 'nemus' which means forest, in reference to the plant's habitat. Other common names for this flower are, thimbleweed, moonflower and smell fox, this one possibly being used due to the musky smell of the leaves.

The Wood Anemone is a native of the UK and Northern Europe and, as its name would suggest, likes a habitat of deciduous woodlands and hedgerows. The plant blooms in March, April and on into May making the most of the sunlight before the canopy of the woods closes over and becomes too dense. The flowers of the Wood Anemone will track the sun if it is in a southerly sunny position in the

woods. This is like the Lesser Celandine I wrote about in the last magazine.

Wood Anemone produces seeds but they are mostly infertile and so the plant uses rhizomes (underground roots) to spread. The plant spreads very slowly only 2cm to 5cm in a year and this is probably why the Wood Anemone is used as an ancient woodland indicator. The plant is rarely eaten by animals as it has a bad taste, and it is also poisonous to humans. However, the flower attracts several pollinators and is a favourite of the Hoverfly.

Wood Anemone has in the past been used as a cure for headaches: poultices would be made with the plant in them and then pressed to the head. However, the plant can be a skin irritant for humans, so I am not sure how effective if would have been.

In some cultures, like the Egyptians and the Chinese, there was a belief that anemones would bring illness and the ancient Greeks saw them as a symbol of early death. However, the Romans believed that the flowers were a good luck charm and would pick the first flowers to ward off fevers. The flowers have also been associated with anticipation, renewal and new beginnings. Whatever the symbolism, I think they are one of the prettiest of spring flowers. They can be found in many of our local woodlands and make a fantastic display especially if mixed with Bluebells, creating glorious hues of blue and white across our local woodland floors.

New bus routes for Bengeo

You may have noticed that since the 7th January there are different buses following routes in Bengeo.

Replacing service 333, weekday daytime buses operate hourly to Parker Avenue (H5) and Bengeo Shops (H6) with stops every half hour along most of the route into town along Bengeo Street. At peak times and on Saturdays and Sundays buses will continue to serve both estates as a single loop with these journeys also numbered H6.

The rest of the old 333 service is a separate route from Hertford Bus Station to Foxholes and Pinehurst estates also

linking with Hertford North Station (H1).

The Bengeo route has had a few changes over the years, and a few different buses.



Riding Lights Theatre Production: The Narrow Road


Hertford United Reformed Church, Tuesday 12th March, 7.30pm

A Word from The Rectory

Hovering over the Off button

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



'Isn't it awful?''I can't bear to listen to it anymore.''If I watch the 10 o'clock news before bedtime I don't sleep at night.'

Comments like these are a common lament these days. I'm never entirely sure how best to react to them. A vicar should find a way of looking charitably upon these things. God bless you for your moral indifference. Your lack of compassion. Your social irresponsibility.

There may be mitigating circumstances, of course. Your life may be so weighed down by your own troubles that you can't carry anyone else's. Giving what little spare time you have to current affairs may just leave you feeling wound-up and stressed-out when you've worked hard and deserve some down-time. Sufficient to the day is the evil thereof, and all that.

Strike me down for saying so, but I'm no better arbiter of the world's woes. There's many a news story that has me hurrying across the kitchen for the off button on the radio or sitting on the sofa flicking past the news channels in search of peace and harmony. I could do with the break, to be honest – journalists and reporters have been whispering unpleasantries in my ear all day.

They're now talking about an election warming up at which you half listen because it's not an unimportant event, but you still haven't finished digesting the digested versions of the COVID enquiry to try and understand what was what and who's to blame; but then there's another presidential election unfolding, plus a big article about racial problems in America to read, and you ought to watch the interview with the person who might be

the next prime minister; so you do that while sifting through all the tweets and posts about terrible wars, bad weather, cost of living and climate crisis and after a while you feel you've absorbed a lot of information but learned nothing, and just feel angry or anxious or confused so you switch on the Australian Open hoping to watch Emma Raducanu playing, only she's finished early because she's busy so she says 'throwing up in my mouth' so you turn to Netflix for a temporary reprieve where the fictional problems of any number of stories about a battle-ravaged nuclear-blasted alien-blighted zombie-infested post-apocalyptic world can take your mind off it all.

And relax...

Even if you have dared keep up with things there have been times these last few weeks when it's been hard to keep up with the news – even in barest outline. The speed, the momentousness, the clamour of it, and the short amount of time we have to process – let alone understand – it all increases a sense of feeling overwhelmed.

Someone recently asked, 'Is Britain about to die of news?' It's even been suggested that the news is bad for us; that rather than informing us, it inhibits thinking, makes us passive and indifferent to the suffering of others, while re-affirming our existing prejudices. Add to that the problem of the news itself being faked, distorted or mis-reported and it's tempting to hit the off button and ignore it all – for good.

I'm not sure withdrawal is the answer. It's often when events are at their most confusing and troubling that we need to engage in order to understand them better. The challenge for us seems to be: how do we stay informed about the issues of the day without being overwhelmed or paralysed by them? How do we see clearly, through the forest of words and flashing of images, to what's really going on without first being blinded and then jaded?

We don't want to become the kind of nation described in Deuteronomy, 'A nation without sense, where there is no discernment.' If there's a quality that consumers, deliverers and makers of news

need, it's that gift of discernment: the sound judgement that makes it possible to tell good from bad, recognize truth and integrity; and that makes for wise responses. It can help us in the way we pay attention to news – the time we take to consider it, what to say about it, and recognize what's important.

We need to stay engaged in order to be what the bible encourages us to be: a people 'who understand the times they're living in' so that they can 'know best what to do and discern what the end will be.'
