On the Doorstep

When I think of a quintessential English cottage garden, one of the flowers that comes to mind is the Foxglove. The Foxglove is widespread around the

UK and is a native plant. It can be found growing in various habitats, woodland, hedgerows and grassland.

The Foxglove's Latin name is Digitalis Purpurea, digitalis means finger-like and purpurea means purple, this is in reference to the finger like flowers and the colour of the flowers that are usually a dark pink/purple colour, although you do sometimes see white flowers. As well as the name Foxglove the plant is also known by various other common names, Goblin Gloves, Witch's Gloves, and Dead Men's Bells.

The plant is a perennial or biennial, it produces a tall spike of flowers and can grow to a height of 2 metres. The leaves are a slight oval shape with a toothed edge and have a downy hair over them. The leaves grow in a rosette formation at the base. however as the plant matures the leaves do also start to grow up the stem in an alternating arrangement. The flowers have five petals that are fused together to make the familiar tubular shape, known as a corolla. The flower has a lower lip that acts as a good landing pad for visiting insects and it also has an attractive dark spotted pattern on it. The pattern on the lower lip is even more visible under ultra violet light, this is to attract pollinating insects,

as they are able to see ultra violet light. Foxgloves are a favourite of bumble bees, some butterflies and some moth caterpillars. The flowers open in

sequence from the bottom to the top, by the time the top flowers open the ones at the bottom are already dying off and

producing fruit with the seeds.

All parts of the Foxglove are poisonous, perhaps why it is also known as Dead Men's Bells. The plant contains various chemicals including Cardiac Glycoside, which is a naturally occurring steroid-like compound and is used in various drugs to treat heart failure and irregular heartbeats, such as atrial fibrillation. During World War II when the supply of drugs was short, the British Health Ministry conscripted various plants with Foxglove being one of them. People were encouraged to grow foxgloves and groups like the Women's Institute, Scouts and Guides were encouraged to grow and harvest them for the national dwindling medical reserves. However, touching the plant can also cause irritation, so hopefully they were encouraged to wear gloves.

There are, of course, various myths and legends surrounding the Foxglove. It is said that the plant could raise the dead and kill the living. The plant had a strong

association with fairies who were said to hide in the flowers and that the spotted pattern was in fact their footprints. Foxes were supposed to have used the flower as gloves (hence the name), to help them silently creep up on their prey, those poor old hens!

As May seeps into June and on into the summer, keep a look out for the tall showy spires of the beautiful Foxglove.

Friends of St Leonard's



We are getting ready for our summer season at St Leonard's Church, the ancient heart of Bengeo, this summer.

Wall Paintings

We are very proud of the rare wall paintings found in St Leonard's. The 13th century painting of the Deposition from the Cross is an amazing survival and the brick and lozenge-shaped decoration in the chancel gives us a glimpse into the way the church would have looked in the medieval era.

The paintings are exposed to some extreme cold and the general fragility of the walls, so it is important that we review their condition from time to time. We were delighted to welcome Opus Conservation Ltd into the church last year to carry out this assessment. Opus (www.opusconservation.co.uk) is a respected and expert consultant who worked on projects in many churches plus some major buildings like Hampton Court Palace and the House of Lords.

Dr Elizabeth Woolley and Dr Amarilli Rava visited the church last April to assess how well the full set of wall paintings are standing up to the passage of time. They reported that the wall paintings are in reasonable condition – especially considering their age – and they recommended some conservation work to stabilise the surface of the paintings. This will be taking place in May, so our paintings will be secured for future years.

The Friends of St Leonard's are delighted to be able to support this important conservation work. We have received some grant funding for the assessment work and hope to receive more for the conservation work itself. Becoming a member of the Friends and visiting and contributing to the upkeep of the church all help us continue to do this



Hollywood comes to Bengeo

Sophie Golding tells us how her family came to have a crew of 60 including Hollywood stars in their house for a week to shoot the film 'Preschool'. Preschool is a comedy about the rivalry between two fathers vying to secure the last place in a prestigious prep school. One parent lived in a cabin in the garden and the other parents lived in the house.

Sophie says, "It all started with my friend who runs a nearby location agency. We have been on their books for a few years, but it has mainly been little shoots for Argos and Sainsbury's adverts and things like that. Then this big, big filming job came in.

The film company normally do a recce to see 3 or 4 houses. When they came round the first time we were all a little bit starstruck. We were overwhelmed by the American crew and we didn't even know who the lead actor Josh Duhamel was. But we got the job! We had a few meetings with the art department first and they were here for three days prepping before the filming. They painted the front of the house and came with big lorries to take loads of our furniture out and bought their own stuff in which was quite daunting. I remember them taking my desk out and had to run and rescue my laptop from it. It was amazing how much equipment and huge trucks they had.

Then they built the cabin in the middle of the garden so that it was visible from the kitchen. We moved out from Monday to Friday when they were actually filming as we couldn't really stay when there were about 50 people milling around. We hired a

cabin for a week at Roydon Marina while they were filming.

When they finished on the Friday, we moved back in and then they came on the Monday and Tuesday to take everything down and restore the house to normal. I understand they filmed in other places in Hertford: Hertford House Hotel, County Hall and as far afield as Xscape in Milton Keynes.

We saw how making a film is not glamorous. It was so cold and the crew were all standing about outside working from 8am. They did also hire the house next door as a Green Room for the actors, and another house over the road for the children to play in.

When can we see the film? As it was made by an independent company, I don't know where it will be released but it is probably out sometime next year. It was a lot of work for only 8 minutes of film, but I hope our neighbours will think it was worth it for the disruption caused along the road. Maybe we can get a local showing to invite people in Bengeo.

And afterwards – well, they took pictures beforehand and put everything back exactly the same in our house. Would we do it again? We did not mind the disruption as it is an old house and we are not precious about things. We have a really nice community in Duncombe Road, but we do not think our neighbours will thank us for letting huge crew film come here again soon. We hope it will be worth it when they see the finished film."


Hertford Adult Learning Group News

Change and continuity at The Avenue Shops

Good News

It is 20 years this March since Ash (pictured) took over Good News, the newsagents, tobacconist and confectioner's shop on The Avenue.

Ash has developed the merchandise over the years to accommodate the needs of local people as lifestyles and residents have changed. Many of the population on the Molewood estate moved in with young families in the 1960s and 70s so the shops are serving an older clientele. Ash is catering for this changing community and refurbished his shop about three years ago to find room for new supplies.

Ash is now stocking more household goods, stationery and cards, frozen food, ready meals, wine and spirits, petfood, bread and milk for those on the estate who find it more difficult to travel into Hertford.

Ash still runs newspaper deliveries although fewer people now use the service. Even though many on the estate are older, there are still enough young families to provide a steady supply of newspaper delivery boys and girls.

Having Ash to cater for our needs is 'good news' for residents and for dogs in Bengeo as Ash is always ready to give them a treat, even if they are not allowed in!





The Secret Garden Café

Jo has been running the establishment for 21 years now and, like Ash, has accommodated changes over that time. She started out selling greengrocery and flowers, then developed into a wedding florist.

Nowadays, Jo runs a successful café which is open from 8am to 2pm from Tuesday to Saturday. Breakfast, cakes, pastries and light meals are on offer with cosy inside seating and outside seating when weather permits.

Jo is keen to support the local community and hosts the Bereavement Café every month. She also gives room to local crafts people, jewellers, ceramicists, silversmiths, candle makers and artists, to display their goods. There are also occasional Art Classes in the afternoon. The local company Memory Scents has a range of lotions, candles and diffusers there. All the profits from this company go towards Alzheimer's charities.

The pop-up Cheese Shop, specialising in British artisan cheese, is also on the premises on Thursday afternoons from 2pm to 5pm.

Walton Vets

The branch of Walton Veterinary practice has been in The Avenue for 12 years, taking over from the launderette. It mainly deals with vaccinations, check-ups and over-the-counter remedies for pets. Diagnostics are carried out on the premises by the vets who are there from Tuesday to Friday but any operations, blood tests and more complicated procedures are dealt with at the main Ware Office.

They saw an overwhelming demand for puppies during Covid, when people were at home and could take a dog for walks, but now they cope with more anxiety issues as dogs are left at home and their



owners are back at work. Many dog owners have bought a second dog as a companion.

The vets treat mainly small furry animals, such as dogs, cats, rabbits and guinea pigs, but occasionally they have more exotic visitors like birds, tortoises, iguanas and sometimes even a snake. Fortunately, their main vet Helen (pictured)has training in dealing with these pets.

Avenue Pharmacy



Pharmacist Saran Sachdeva (pictured) took over the premises 8 years ago and it has been a welcome and wellused facility during that time. It is always busy and local people appreciate having this service on their doorstep. Because of the good service and availability of local parking a number of clients come from outside Bengeo to pick up their preordered prescriptions.

Other medical services have been developed since establishing the pharmacy. They can now offer travel vaccinations, as well as flu jabs and Covid jabs when in season. Pharmacy First is a new service for providing diagnostics and prescriptions for common viral problems, such as throat or ear infections, carrying out blood pressure checks and dispensing contraceptive pills. They are increasingly seeing more private prescriptions as more people go down this route for treatment.



Headlines

Sue Sexton (pictured on the right with her team) set up the hairdressers in The Avenue over 40 years ago and has seen many changes over that time in colouring and styling. The salon still has some of the original clients and are now serving their children and grandchildren. Over the years the salon has expanded into another unit with more staff and the addition of Indulgence beauty salon.

The staff keep up with new trends and techniques and Sue is very keen on investing in young people. She takes on apprentices starting at age 16 who have a three-year training scheme qualifying at age 19. For the whole team, there is training on new L'Oreal products and techniques five times a year.

Sue is well-known for her charity work and is a trustee at QEII hospital. The salon has raised an amazing amount of around £750,000 for charity over the last 30 years, with the Isabel Hospice and Herts Breast Unit the main benefactors. The fundraising events have included bike rides, zip wires, treks to Machu Pichu and Nepal, skydiving and cake sales.

A large audience in Holy Trinity church last month was treated to wonderful performances by musicians from The Academy of St Martin in the Fields. This included a Haydn quartet, a modern piece by Caroline Shaw, a new arrangement of Amy Beach's Dreaming and a superb rendering of the Schubert Cello Quintet in C Major.

Fiona Bonds, Associate Principal Viola with The Academy of St Martin in the Fields, developed the concert and other outreach music programmes in Bengeo with colleagues from the orchestra. These are part of the Marriner Project (named after Neville Marriner, the founder of the ASMF). The project supports initiatives of orchestra members to put on concerts and carry out community ventures. Locally, there is a series of three concerts for Holy Trinity, Bengeo: an ensemble for last Remembrance Day, the above performance and a trio with flute, harp and viola to come on the 6th June. Further outreach takes place at Beane River View on the morning of the concerts where the group play pieces from the evening performance.

The concerts are an opportunity for these groups to do some really imaginative programming and we get to hear talented musicians which have been funded by the project. The church benefits from the proceeds of tickets sales but also carries out the publicity for the events. As a further development of the Project Fiona also presented the Schubert quintet at the Sacred Grounds Café in Soho with an extended talk on the piece and a Q and A session afterwards.

At Beane River View on the 28th March, Ralph, one of the residents, was there with his recorder and Fiona explained, "We were playing a concert to the residents and Ralph wanted to join in so we said, OK, that's fine. But the problem was that Ralph was sitting down at the other end of the room from us, so when he started up the other residents didn't find it as easy to hear what we were doing and they and Ralph started to get annoyed which was a shame. I said to him, come and sit up with us while we play. We were about to start and then he just launched into this really beautiful little folk melody on the recorder. He played so well, it was perfectly in tune, lovely sound. We just joined in and started improvising around him and did a little kind of drone base and just some accompaniment. It was quite a simple tune so it was quite easy for us to kind of make something up around it. He played it and everyone burst into applause, and it was really moving."

Fiona continued, "it has inspired us the next time we go in June do something a bit more interactive with the residents rather than just playing to them perhaps they can join in with songs. Because I'm playing with the flute and a harp, I am sure Ralph will enjoy joining the flautist. Our visits have been really rewarding as it is such a warm and considerate place with a nice atmosphere."

We are so fortunate in Bengeo to have visits from such dedicated and talented musicians who take time out of their busy lives to give us wonderful performances and support the community.

Bengeo Community Garden

The daffodils are out and practically shouting Spring as you walk past or come to sit in the garden. What next? Well, thanks to East Herts District Council's Community Fund, work will start shortly on the beautiful, but battered, cast iron perimeter fence. We're not aiming for neat perfection, just gentle restoration to preserve it for years to come. Meanwhile Mudlarks will continue their regular maintenance and our thoughts will be turning to how best we can water the garden through the summer months. We're looking for water butts and watering cans so let us know if you have any you can donate.

A Word from The Rectory

Jennifer's peace piece

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



Bengeo's longest ever serving parish organist died on Ash Wednesday. There was always something rather special about Jennifer Newton, but it took me a while to notice. The clues were there from the start.

Very soon after I arrived as vicar here I noticed a rather unusual habit of Jennifer's. Come Sunday morning, her rather smart car would pull up over the road from the church, always in the same spot. The hand

brake would go on and the engine would stop. But Jennifer would remain sat in her car, quite still, sometimes for quite some time.

What was going on, I wondered? Was she summoning the muse to carry her through a Sunday morning leading God's praises? Was she summoning patience to endure the new vicar's dreadful choice of hymns? I couldn't be sure of anything until Jennifer eventually emerged from her driving seat and reappeared on the organ bench ready to play so wonderfully as she always did. And she did. Crisis averted.

And then came a Saturday afternoon and a wedding, a grand musical occasion when the clergy play second fiddle to the parish organist, I always think – so you'll understand my nerves when I turned up at church to find Jennifer once again sat in her car, apparently rooted to the spot.

By this time I had got to know this rather demure lady a little better, and some reasons for her sitting in her car could now be ruled out. She wouldn't be waiting for the racing results. She wouldn't be checking her pools coupon or catching the football commentary. Whatever it was that kept Jennifer in her seat I now had confidence that she'd emerge when good and ready, appear at the organ perfectly

on time and deliver yet another glorious performance.

So far, so mysterious, until one Sunday evening when all was revealed. Arriving at church for evensong I pulled up behind Jennifer's car, and there she was – engine off, perched behind the steering wheel, quite still. It was a wonder that I'd noticed as much, because I was in a bit of a reverie myself at the time, sailing to church, swept along by some beautiful music on the car radio.

I'm sure there's many a time when the power of music has transported you somewhere close to God before ever you've got through the front door of a church. And it seemed Jennifer thought so too. The music finished, I sighed and leant forward to switch off the radio and noticed the lady in the car in front doing the same thing too.

We both stepped out of our cars. We looked at one another. 'Have you just been listening to that wonderful music, Jennifer?' I asked. She smiled in assent. 'Stuff like that gets you to God, doesn't it? Maybe we should just go home now.'

To be able to attend to beauty – to make time in our lives to sit very still in awe and wonder – that's a gift. Overloaded and distracted generation that we are, rarely do we ever espouse the benefits of doing nothing but listening and quietly attending to the world around us, to something beautiful, something greater than ourselves.

Jennifer paid attention to life, and through patience and humility learnt that it is a vastly richer, deeper, more mysterious business than it ever occurs us to suspect on our human journey. She did not let it pass her by. She had wisdom enough to take notice, and talent enough to join in.

Despite her long service to Bengeo there's every chance you've never heard of Jennifer Newton. Though in complete command of the organ console of her local parish church for many thousands of services over the course of 56 years, Jennifer was herself almost notoriously quiet. That in itself makes for a lasting epitaph. It humbles me to think that here in our increasingly noisy and raucous culture

was a lady whose dedication to music and to public service stood as a gentle witness to the ultimate end of life.

All good musicians know that sense of completion that comes after the closing cadence when the music stops. All those notes that went before create the stillness after it.

Peace. That peace piece, Jennifer. It was the very best you played.
