Hertford U3A

Those of you who attended the Holy Trinity Church 'Sing Noel' Christmas service in December heard our small team play. A number of people have asked about us and our bells so this is an opportunity to tell you about our group in Bengeo and The Fuller Bells.

As a new Hertford U3A activity, in 2012, under the leadership of Jennifer Thomas, six people joined up to learn how to play handbells. We were very fortunate to be taught by a couple of experienced members from Broxbourne Handbell Ringers, a large and well established team.

Our team initially met fortnightly at Haileybury's Social Club, borrowing bells variously from Holy Trinity Church and Watton at Stone's Church. Over the next few years the membership of our team changed, depending on people's commitments and interest, but a core group became established. We moved our practices to the Church Hall in Duncombe Road and for the last couple of years have met weekly at my home in The Drive.

Back in 2013, I was inspired by a concert at Ware Drill Hall given by the highly regarded East Anglian Regional Handbell Team. On the seats were flyers inviting people to try out at Broxbourne. I, and then others from our team, went along. Those of you who know me realise that from there on in I became totally hooked (obsessed?) and have continued to ring with Broxbourne Handbell Ringers, as do some others of our team. Belonging to Broxbourne has provided our team with new skills and avenues. It transpired that Broxbourne was the keeper of a set of handbells that was not being used. These bells are not tuned to concert pitch and so cannot be played with other bells or instruments that are (more on that later). I was asked if our team would like to borrow them on a permanent basis. Oh yes, and so we have become the proud keeper of The Fuller Bells.

The Fuller Bells

These handbells are special; unique in fact. The inscription on the biggest bell reads "Symondsons's, Bell Founders, 1, Tottenham Court Road, London" and probably dates from sometime in the early 1800s. Although Henry and his son Phillip recorded their occupations as bell founders, they did not actually cast their own handbells. A brass and bronze founder in Shoe Lane produced blanks and the Symondsons tuned and finished them. I won't go into the lengthy history of the Symondsons, except to say that Hertford features prominently. I will save that for another time! What I will add though is that Henry Symondson was considered to be an excellent tuner. Handbells were originally produced to complement sets of tower bells for practising and later for playing tunes. It is surmised that this set, pitched in D Major, was probably used around the Holborn area of London.

What we do know is that these handbells were acquired by Toc H, (founded by the philanthropist, Rev Tubby Clayton), and used as an activity for the wounded and disabled between and after World Wars One and Two. In 1951, Mr Dick Norrell, who was heavily involved in Toc H, set up the George Fuller Club for the Blind in the Hoddesdon/Turnford area. He named the club after his close friend who had been a journalist, BBC script writer and local resident and had died a few months earlier. The bells were given to the club to be used as an activity.

However, handbells need careful handling and storage and Broxbourne was later asked to look after them. As mentioned earlier, the set is not tuned to concert pitch, so they were stored but rarely used by Broxbourne except for a commitment to give an annual performance at the Fuller Club. Although numbers are dwindling, the Club still exists, meeting monthly in Wormley. As custodians of the bells we uphold that commitment and go each February to entertain the members and their carers, always receiving a warm welcome. We are very grateful that, in 2017, Hertford U3A helped finance refurbishment of the bells as that has greatly enriched their timbre. In 2018 our team formally

Bengeo Lives – EDWARD ARCHIBALD BROWN



In these strange times when people are walking the countryside around Bengeo more than ever and taking in the local scenery I thought it

might be appropriate to feature an artist that lived locally and painted and drew many scenes around Bengeo.

Edward Archibald Brown or E A Brown R A as he is more widely known lived at 'Newlyn', 21 Duncombe Road.

He was born in 1866 in Eastwood, Nottingham, the son of Edward Adolphus Brown, a Physician, and his wife Alice. His

Libby Shillito

father died in 1878 and the family moved to Croydon where Edward studied at the Royal College of Art. He was appointed headmaster of the Hertford School of Art in the 1890s. The school had been founded in 1880, moving to the first floor of the public library on Old Cross when it was built in 1889. He resigned in 1908 although he continued to teach for some years after. The appointment is probably the reason he came to Hertford and in 1901 he was lodging in a house in Villiers Street. Edward showed just four exhibits at the Royal Academy, 1900–03. Landscapes by him are in the



collections of Hertford Museum. In 1903 he married Gertrude Minnie Stapes in All Saints Church, Hertford and

they then moved to Duncombe Road. It can be surmised that they called the house 'Newlyn' as he was an admirer





of the Newlyn School of painters. He painted a number of local scenes over the years he lived in

Bengeo. Minnie died in 1925 at Hill End Hospital, St Albans, and Edward in 1935 in Hertford. Both are buried together in Holy Trinity, Bengeo. Edward was a very private man of whom very little is known but his pictures tell us everything about his passion for his art and the place he lived. The Dictionary of British Art identifies him as a fruit painter although almost all his surviving pictures are landscapes of which Hertford Museum have quite a few.

It has been a very strange time for everyone since the government's announcement that schools should close. Mill Mead has stayed open for the few hildren of key

workers who cannot be kept safely at home. The staff have been working to a rota to come in and support these children and, when not needed, they have worked at home.



Every week class teachers have been providing a range of exciting activities on class pages on the school website - a Maths and English activity for every day, some topic work, PE and French as well as some mindfulness activities. The teachers and I have also sent weekly messages,

and I have recorded a weekly video of one of the songs we sing in music assembly in case the children are missing these and want to sing along! I know parents have been working really hard to support their children's learning at home – it's not always easy!

One parent, who runs a stationery company, very generously delivered free stationery packs to all the children in his daughters' classes on his daily walks and then opened the offer to the rest of the school. So many children have enjoyed a 'stationery experience' which you don't get from a computer and have loved using the variety of paper and envelopes to write some lovely letters to family and friends.

Pupils have been able to send examples of what they've been doing to teachers, teaching assistants and me. The younger children in Early Years have been keeping in contact using Tapestry, an online tool. It has been lovely to see how families have engaged and adjusted to the new situation in which we find ourselves – so much creativity and so many shared experiences.

The children who are in school have had access to the same activities on the website as those children at home but obviously with access to the school site they have also been able to do other things. They have particularly enjoyed sowing seeds and maintaining the lovely school garden as well as painting, craft activities and PE sessions led by a Year 6 pupil! Snacks are provided every day and the school kitchen supervisor comes in daily to make a lunch for those who want it. The staff have been thoroughly enjoying the time with the children who have been absolute stars!

The strength of the whole school community has once again shone through with the 'we're all in it together' mentality. I do hope that it will not be too long before we can safely reopen school and all be together again.

A Word from The Rectory From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson Life at Easter



There is a reading popular at many funeral services written by a clergyman, Canon Henry Scott Holland. It begins, 'Death is nothing at all.' I have just one problem with my esteemed colleague – he was clearly wrong. Death is not 'nothing at all.' Death is dreadful. Its power is irresistible and inexorable and total, and it will not be denied.

But there must be a comforting word or a consoling thought to offer people in their grief. During the lockdown, with scarcely a hand to hold or a shoulder to cry on it's essential they be given some hope to hang on to. Although the churches are shut, funeral services are still being taken by local clergy around the country, and people have come – no more than 10 at a time, of course – all arranged around the cemetery or crematorium at a careful distance from one another, and determined as ever that death shall not have the last word.

So we speak about life – we speak openly and honestly about how precious life is, how frail and fleeting, vibrant and beautiful. Life is God's first gift to us, so Christians believe, which is why we accompany people on their life's journey from cradle to grave, baptism to funeral; it's why we gather to mourn the loss of life and, in prayer and song, celebrate its victory. And it is why at this season we tell the Easter story – to remember what God tells us about life, to hear his final say on the matter.

Life is a miracle – that is what God tells us. Consider the marvel of every leaf of every tree and every blade of grass. Observe the wonder of every cell in every human body, so gloriously diverse and amazingly unique. Mark the marvel of every thought in that mysterious electrochemical system that is the human brain, the dance of atoms in their electric field in universal matter. Behold the beauty of babies, the magnificence of Mozart, the glory of a copper-coloured sky, a songbird's speckled wing.

I don't think anyone who has watched one tiny microscopic virus bringing the whole of humanity to its knees can be indifferent to life anymore. Coronavirus has brought us face to face with some vivid truths: that the miracle of life is something fragile and vulnerable, yet impossibly beautiful and infinitely good. Life in all its abundance, its trials and tragedies, its glory and its joy – that's what Jesus shares with us in his cross and resurrection, a heart-to-heart relationship between God and humanity, his eternal presence in our immediate now.

Because it's the present moment we have to reckon with. St Paul knew this. Long before the Gospel writers told their Easter stories, he was sat at his desk eager to share the good news of the resurrection with his scattered church communities. He writes nothing about the events leading up to Jesus' crucifixion, nor his burial, nor even the empty tomb; his interest was in the reality of now, the experience of the present moment. 'All I know is Christ, he says, 'and the power of his resurrection...'

For Paul, the resurrection of Jesus is not an event that happened to someone else way back and far away, he is not interested when or where or how things happened once upon a time; resurrection – God's choice of life – that is all he ever wants to know, and knowing it has caused him to rethink what is possible, to look out at the world around him with astonished and grateful wonder, and dare believe in God's limitless power to create and redeem, to bless and preserve, to sink deep into our human plight and rise and overcome.

Life imperishable, life everlasting – God-made, God-given – God will not let that die. That we celebrate Jesus' resurrection in this sombre season of Coronavirus is not glib or flippant – it is the death-defying promise we're making one another that in this great struggle between tragedy and triumph, fear and faith, death and life, we are already on the winning side.

God is a lover. He cannot forget us – no lover ever could. He doesn't offer us the miraculous gift of life only to snatch it back again. He doesn't create us in his image, then watch that image fade and fail. He doesn't reveal himself in Jesus to prove what we already know: that life is hard and dicey, that death is cruel and bitter. He comes to proclaim that this creation is his creation, that you and I are endlessly precious, life is his crowning joy.

At this Eastertide and through the Coronavirus season, millions of Christians are celebrating the good news of the resurrection, not as a past event – some old story in the bible – nor some future fantasy or wild daydream, but a now event. Easter is God's response to events in this world that can change human hearts by offering new hope far beyond the limits of our prediction.

The message that life is stronger than death, that healing, renewal and restoration are not only our wish but the very will of God is what our weary world wants to hear right now. Which is why, of all the things I might say in such difficult times, it's better that I stand back and give you God's word on it. There is life at Easter. Alleluia!
