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

Bengeo Field Housing Proposal – the BNAP Response



When I grew up houses were being built literally everywhere. Riding on a train you would see a village and next to it a massive new housing estate. The reasons for the 60s housing boom were many – housing destroyed in Second World War, a national

effort to knock down the old city slums. The reasons for housing needs today are different but also pressing. Houses are too expensive for young people to get on the housing ladder – there is an acute lack of social housing. But here in the already overcrowded South East does it make sense to destroy our precious Green Belt with the desire to pack in yet more people?

I'm not going to try and answer this question, but it is at the heart of the issue that is facing us as a community right now. Should we allow a precious area of former Green Belt on Bengeo Field to help satiate the unquenchable housing demand?

As a Neighbourhood Plan it is our duty to suggest possible locations for new houses and the area proposed for development was already allocated when our plan was in its infancy. This limits us to some extent in opposing this housing scheme. It is somewhat of a dilemma.

However, we came to the view that we should reflect the overwhelming local opposition to this plan in our response. The proposed plan is also contra to the Local Plan (as it is phrased right now).

I have posted the full response to Facebook and it will also be available on the lovebengeo.org.uk website and on the East Herts Planning Portal. But the main reason for objection are as follows:

a) Part 2 of HERT 4 (around 100 new houses on Bengeo Field) was subject to prior phased extraction of gravel and EHDC has always made it clear that without this the scheme would not go ahead, the gravel has not been extracted so the houses should not be built.

- b) The proposed scheme would detract from two important views listed in the Neighbourhood Plan namely the view towards the lonely oak and the view towards Ware Park Manor.
- c) Byway 1 which crosses the field is much used by local people for health walks, dog walking and other leisure pursuits. The proposed scheme would have a severe impact on byway 1 and thus this activity.
- d) We agree with Hertfordshire County Council that a health impact assessment has not been undertaken and we furthermore feel that building houses on this site could have a significant negative impact on the health of local people.
- e) We agree with the Environment Agency that the Suds drainage scheme as currently proposed poses an unacceptable risk to the water supply of our area. A risk assessment needs to be carried out so that our groundwater is not polluted.

These in short are some of our primary objections. But we have also made suggestions for the houses should planning permission be granted. We would like to see solar panels on the houses, we would prefer it if no roads crossed Byway 1. We have suggested that semi mature trees should be planted so that the houses are screened more quickly than could otherwise be achieved.

We will have to wait and see whether the houses get planning permission or not. I would not be surprised if this decision takes some time to resolve. Our local scheme is just one of many, some of the issues thrown up are ones that can only be addressed at a Governmental level.

We as a Neighbourhood Plan are not opposed to housing as such, but we are strongly against this scheme as currently conceived.

Everyone creates their own coping strategies or rules for living. But what happens when an extended family gathers in the kitchen for a traditional Christmas and they each follow those rules rigidly?



On The Doorstep – White Dead Nettle

In this edition of On The Doorstep, I thought I would take a look at the White Dead Nettle, Lamium Album. The white nettle is a perennial and can be seen flowering right into December. Despite the name Dead Nettle, it is not related to the stinging nettle at all, but is part of the mint family, Lamiaceae, which includes plants like thyme, sage and lavender among others. This large family of plants takes their name from Greek mythology and the Lamia. The Lamia was a half woman, half serpent monster who ate children and her name translates to gaping mouth. The shape of the flowers in this family resemble a gaping mouth, hence the connection.

Some of the other common names for this plant are, white

Wildflowers in Holy Trinity Churchyard

Since the grass has been left to flourish and set seed in parts of the churchyard, we are seeing the benefits in greater diversity of species. Bridget Hersant has carried out a short survey of the area and has come up with these additions to the flora.

The first flowers are the ones she thinks are probably growing because there has been less cutting:

- DD Lesser Stitchwort
- DD Squill
- DD Hedge Bedstraw
- DD Hawkbit
- DD Dark Green Alkanet
- DD Vetch possibly Tufted Vetch

Others are more widespread, but that may not be as a result of less cutting:

- DD Lesser Celandine
- DD Oxeye Daisy
- DD Primrose
- DD Campanula Rotundifolia
- DD Yellow Corydalis
- DD Meadow Saxifrage

Some may also be garden escapees.

archangel, helmet flower, Adam and Eve and blind nettle amongst others.

The white dead nettle has heart shaped, deep toothed leaves and looks remarkably similar to the stinging nettle, however, it does not sting which is probably why they are known as 'dead'. The dead nettle has short hairs on the stem whereas the stinging nettle has long hairs and the flowers of each plant are very different. The stinging nettle has

flowers that hang in clusters away from the stem and the dead nettle has pretty little hooded flowers that have a lower lip that acts as a landing platform for insects. The flowers grow in pairs around the stem.

The white dead nettle, is a perennial and can grow to 60cm. It can be found growing almost anywhere, in hedgerows, along paths and roadsides, as well as woodland. There are also other dead nettles – purple/red dead


nettle and yellow archangel as well as others. Purple dead nettle has beautiful red leaves at the top, it only grows to about 30cm and is an annual, unlike the white dead nettle. Yellow archangel also only grows to about 30cm but like the white dead nettle, is also a perennial.

White dead nettle is edible. The young uncooked leaves have a mild peppery taste, while the cooked leaves have a similar taste to spinach. The plant is very nutritious containing lots of vitamin C, A and K as well as iron. It has been used medically for skin conditions such as eczema, as well as sore throats and stomach issues. This may be because it has anti-inflammatory properties.

White dead nettle has one of my favourite folklore stories. If you look at the white dead nettle flower and turn it upside down you will see dark stamen that look like little pairs of shoes. The stories are, that either the fairies kept stealing the centipedes' shoes or it was the pixies who were stealing the fairies' shoes, but in order to stop this from happening the centipede or fairy hid their shoes in the hood of the dead nettle flower. A sweet little tale.

So, on your travels keep a look out for this interesting and versatile plant, the white dead nettle. Oh, and of course keep a look out for those pesky little pixies or fairies stealing shoes!

Free refills in Hertford

Dozens of local businesses in Hertford have joined the 'Refill Revolution' to cut plastic pollution. They've joined a global network of places helping us all avoid, reduce, reuse and refill, whether that's by offering free refills for your water bottle while you're out and about, or by selling toiletries, laundry liquids or food for your home.

In Hertford, Mudlarks, Courtyard Arts, Leaf, Caffé Nero and Costa Coffee are among the many cafes taking part, with the station cafe at Hertford North signed up too. Plus Natural Health at Old Cross provides a comprehensive refill service and several pubs offer free water top ups too.

With 300,000 refill stations around the world, offering refills for water, coffee, food containers and plastic-free shopping, Refill, the network behind the scheme, estimates 100 million pieces of plastic have been avoided so far.

A Word from The Rectory 6th Century St Leonard – a Saint for today

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



They came here in small boats. They crossed the channel, a small armada heading for our shores, foreign invaders from 'over there.' The rulers recognised a crisis when they saw one. The people agreed that something should be done. Some were angry. Some were afraid. No one knew what would happen next.

As it happened, the Norman invasion of 1066 turned out to be a watershed moment in the life of the nation. There was no particular feeling of outraged nationalism following the conquest – that concept is a much more modern construct – so peasants would not have felt their country had somehow been lost. In the Middle Ages, visitors to an area that came from a distant town were regarded as just as 'foreign' as someone from another country.

Still, you can't help but wonder what the locals made of it when the Normans arrived in Bengeo and started building a church dedicated to a 6th century peacemaker and social activist – their holy hero, Leonard.

Leonard was an international figure, a reconciler, a minister for God. He witnessed to a God who has no nationality and is free from parochial interests, a God who isn't bound by any culture, belongs to none of us and loves all of us.

What Leonard offered to the people of Bengeo was an openness to the human diversity of the world. And he's still here, his story still relevant, slap bang on the cultural map, right in the middle of one of the fiercest debates of the day, and bravely holding opposing sides together.

Few national conversations have been quite so sharply polarised as that on immigration and integration policy, the loudest voices characterised as 'xenophobes' and 'xenophiles.' Donald Trump was charged with xenophobia for his collective statements about all Mexicans. Nigel Farage's comments about all Eastern Europeans were labelled xenophobic. The xenophile is one who practises hospitality to strangers and foreigners as a form of moral obligation whoever they are and wherever they've come from. It's a classic dichotomy.

Xenophobe or xenophile? Neither term is easy to live with. They sound like crude caricatures, a way of talking that leads us into attitudes toward foreigners based on pigeon-holed identities and broad generalisations. There's more to them than the stereotypes.

Martin Luther King Jr. had it right, 'Shallow understanding from people of good will is more frustrating than absolute misunderstanding from people of ill will.'



Leonard by contrast, was committed and engaged. His life's work receiving prisoners, strangers and aliens to his community was not some general nonspecific form of xenophilia. He understood the 'xenos' to be a quite specific individual, not a broad group. Migrant. Immigrant. Asylum seeker. Refugee. These are names we give to human beings, each with a story, all of whom Leonard wanted to know.

It's a form of hospitality that needs another Greek word altogether – 'philoxenia'.

St Paul wrote, 'Do not forget to show hospitality (philoxenia) to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it'. Jesus said, 'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me'. Leonard said... well we don't know what Leonard said, we know him only by his actions. But were he to offer us a word for today it would be philoxenia. And he would show us what it meant. Philoxenia that doesn't disregard the visitor on the basis of what you can see at a distance, philoxenia that inhibits the fear of the foreigner, philoxenia that dispels prejudice and intolerance, unaware and uninformed.

Why is there a church dedicated to St Leonard in Bengeo? A memorial to foreign invaders? A power play by Norman intruders?

It was built by people who understood the meaning of 'philoxenia' – a word to make a community strong.
