

Many residents are devastated that the 118 new homes on Bengeo Field were given the go-ahead. Your Bengeo Ward Councillors Alex Daar, Ben Crystall and Vicky Smith and others from the BNAP and Save Bengeo Field campaign attended the Development Management Committee meeting in September and spoke against the application, yet it was subsequently approved.

The Bengeo application was discussed for three hours with the DMC, with points raised about transport, infrastructure, water and affordable housing. Aska Pickering, Chair of the Save Bengeo Field campaign (SBF), expressed the views of residents that serious points about the special value of landscape and amenity were not given due weight. Two areas continue to be a major concern threat of contamination to Hertford's water supply and pressure on an already overburdened sewage system. Both issues have been highlighted by SBF campaign on numerous occasions through expert reports and evidence of historical problems. SBF campaign does not feel mitigation processes have been explored sufficiently to prevent a threat of contamination to the drinking water. They also believe that adequate regard has not been afforded to reduce how the extra housing will impact the existing sewage system.

Councillor Sarah Hopewell, Executive Member for Wellbeing at EHC, explained that all local authorities are legally required to follow national planning policy and the government requires councils to provide a minimum of new homes based on a housing need calculation. The basis of planning is the District Plan and the BNAP which included Bengeo Field (Hert4) as a future potential development site. Decisions on development are weighted heavily against local councils and there are cases where the Planning Inspector has overruled councils who rejected similar developments in Hertfordshire.

The Save Bengeo Field group thanks all the residents and campaigners who provided continued support. Nevertheless, it believes that the wishes of local residents and previous EHDC statements were not taken sufficiently into account during the DMC meeting and is taking expert advice on the next steps.

Meanwhile, the new government has been reviewing national planning policy. While this review is underway councillors have suggested that this is a chance to put forward views on what future planning policy should look like.

Go Outdoors

Walking for pleasure and health

Veronica Fraser, a volunteer Health Walks leader encourages us to get outside.

"Looking out of your window at this time of year and your first thought may not be 'I can't wait to get outdoors' but in Bengeo we have some wonderful countryside right on our doorstep, sociable groups to walk with and you can enjoy the Autumn colour changes and the many health benefits of walking.

The benefits? As a weight bearing exercise walking is guaranteed to increase heart and lung fitness, resulting in stronger bones and better balance, whilst reducing body fat. These are important factors in reducing the risks of diabetes, heart disease and stroke.

To maximise these health benefits we should try to walk briskly for 30 minutes a day but simply walking several times a week is good.

No sense of direction? Don't like walking alone? There are a number of local groups who would welcome you along."

Hertfordshire Health Walks

Veronica is a leader for Hertfordshire Health Walks which have walks almost every day. The nearest walk sets off from Bengeo Avenue shops every Tuesday at 10am to walk for $1^{1}/_{2}$ hours before returning for coffee.

On Wednesdays you could join a much shorter flat walk around Hartham. On Sundays we take advantage of the many paths around Hartham for a long walk.

HHW and other groups were out in force at a 'Breathe Easy' event at BEAM recently. Jan Kirk, a new member of HHW, says, "I read about the walks while I was working and now I am retired and after COVID I needed to get moving again. I spoke to the nurse at my surgery, and she put me in touch with the organiser. My first week was just me and two volunteers, but it grew from there and now there are 10 in the group. We go at the pace of the slowest walking for about an hour and end up with a coffee afterwards. The social side is important as I have made new friends who now socialise together." Jane Tether, who is a volunteer with the group, says, "Please come as we need more volunteers."

U3A Walking Groups

If you are a member of the U3A you may already be aware they have several walking groups. Mike West explains how he got involved as a leader and how he benefits from longer walks. He says "When I retired and ceased commuting, I was keen to maintain some way of keeping moving and expanding my horizons, both literally and metaphorically. I had done some national long distance walks many years ago, including the South Downs Way, Offa's Dyke Walk and similar routes in France. Group walking in a regular and an organised way, enjoying the company and fellowship of some new people and discovering aspects of the underrated but wonderful East Herts countryside that I'd not known before seemed ideal. I signed up to two of the Hertford & District U3A groups. The Thursday 2 Group walks about 5 miles twice a month, returning to a pub for lunch. The Long Distance Walkers meet once a month and bring a snack lunch so we are not bound by pub locations. Our walks are usually about 7–10 miles. I find this

greater challenge both stimulating and rewarding. When the group's founder leader retired, I was 'invited' by the group to take over. That was in 2006, and I'm still in the role! This involves arranging a programme of walks led by members who feel able and competent to take this on and encouraging others to come forward and take a turn.

My walking with these groups has given me regular exercise, good conversation, new friendships, a closer relationship with nature and the seasons, plus some excellent walking holidays including the Peak District, Yorkshire Dales and Exmoor."

I would encourage anyone to look for a group suitable to their capabilities (and diary), and if there isn't one yet, to consider forming a new one with others of like mind."



Scouts' News

The experience was part of their Air Activities badge, organised by the Cambridge Gliding Centre in conjunction with Hertfordshire Scouts. Only a few places come up each year, so it was a thrill for the Bengeo Troop to jump in the cockpit with the instructor, and even more exciting to be handed the controls briefly. Zoe,

About our Cover Photo

The image of the Aurora Borealis or Northern Lights on the front cover of the magazine was captured by Barry Goodey's drone one evening in October. These phenomena are short-lived periods of high geomagnetic activity where the Earth's magnetic field changes very quickly and strong electric currents flow high in the atmosphere. The clear, cold evenings in October were ideal for aurora spotting in southern parts of England.

The aurora are caused every few years or so by large explosions on the Sun when huge amounts of charged particles are thrown out into space. These particles sometimes travel towards Earth where they are captured by the Earth's magnetic field and guided towards the geomagnetic polar regions. They are slowed down by Earth's atmosphere, which acts as a shield. The energy released in collisions with oxygen, nitrogen and other gases in the atmosphere reacts and gives off colours of blues, greens, yellows and reds observed in the aurora.

One thing to note is that a digital camera is more sensitive than our eyes and will pick up the colours of the aurora. A faint display may appear white or grey to the eye but a long-exposure photo will pick up the greens, reds or purples. If you use a camera where you can manually set a long exposure time you will be able to see more. A lot of smartphones now have a night mode which can pick up more colours.

'The Soul of Russian Music with a Native Russian' is the intriguing title of Hertford Adult Learning Group's next course at the Parish Church Hall, Duncombe Road, Bengeo.



Hertford and District Churches Together



HDCT is made up of members of each of the churches in town and the surrounding villages getting together to support the community through volunteer commitment, funding, worship and prayer. This enables local projects to flourish and gain further support.

Foodbank Hertford started amongst support and funding from HDCT, ensuring ongoing and wider financial commitment, food donations and volunteer support, with the URC giving generous space. The consistent enthusiasm and challenging work has led to the support from supermarkets, businesses, youth groups and schools. The Foodbank in Hertford is part of the Trussell Trust, which enables close links to Ware, Hoddesdon and parts of North London when required.

Young Life and Wyld Life Hertford both provide safe spaces with games for Young People organised by enthusiastic caring Youth Leaders engaging with young people. They meet in URC church hall, Hertford Baptist Church and outside St Andrews. Young Life also work within and with local Schools, time and space appropriate for young people is made for the word of God.

Future Hope Hertford runs youth groups in the Pioneer Hall on the Ware Road in addition to the bus, a mobile safe space for young people who meet in Hartham and Ware. This is an opportunity for young people venturing out into the evening with friends for the first time to escape from unsafe situations. Future Hope provides mentoring for young people and groups for parents to meet. Future Hope also provides Drug Education services into schools.

Street Pastors continue to work in to the early hours of Friday and Saturday mornings in Hertford and Ware, and at other times the towns are really busy.

The Wellbeing Church is outreach to the 20- to 30year-old age group, using social media, sports and social get togethers that are appropriate to that age group and supports them into local churches.

HDCT also gives grants to local schools to purchase books or other media to assist with teaching about the Love of God. HDCT also supports other groups around the world.

Mill Mead Primary School

Here is what our classes have been doing this term.



Ducklings. Our core book, 'The Ugly Duckling', has provided us with lots of opportunities to think about our Mill Mead school values and how we should treat others. We have created lots of amazing artwork on ducks and swans and

have learned a lot about where those animals live.



Mice. The children started learning about their emotions, with the help of The Colour Monster, linking this to the Zones of Regulation. They created their own monster and

feeling jars, while learning some new vocabulary to express their feelings. They practised their bike safety, spatial awareness and balancing skills on balanceability days with their own bike course set up in school.



Birds. We made wonderful 17th Century houses in the holidays, and it was great to use them to model what London looked like before the Great Fire started. In Maths we

have been working on our number facts within 10. We have been subitising, regrouping, adding and subtracting. In English, we are loving our book 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt'.

Owls. In Science, we are learning all about sound: pitch and volume, and how that changes sound waves and how we hear sounds. In History, we have uncovered the artefacts in King Tutankhamun's tomb, and learned about how artefacts tell us about how people lived. In PE, we are spies in dance and learning netball skills.

Hedgehogs. We used the skills of exploring, investigating, problem solving and creativity when we made felt in one of our art and craft lessons. The children had to follow instructions, cope with new materials and get a bit wet but the end results are a delightful array of colourful creations. They have also written some super historical recounts in English inspired by the book 'Samson's Titanic Journey'.





Squirrels. We enjoyed acting out some of the wellknown Aesop's fables like 'The Boy who Cried Wolf' and 'The Hare and the Tortoise'. More recently, we have been lucky enough to take a trip back in time to The Stone Age with a trip to Celtic Harmony Camp. We loved learning how life was like back then and learned some new key skills which helped our understanding.

Badgers. Have been having fun competing in Times

Tables Rockstars to sharpen multiplication skills. In Music, the students have been learning to play the traditional South African song *Shosholoza* on the xylophones, exploring new rhythms and melodies. They have also been fascinated by our Space topic, making connections in both Science and French.

Foxes. Have been focussing on our own mechanical fox, Malkin – a key character in our class text Cogheart about the Industrial Revolution – rewriting a dramatic chapter of the book from his perspective. In Science, we are exploring circuits and electricity and have been building our own working circuits, experimenting with different elements and observing the outcomes. Most importantly, we finally have our latest cast of Macbeth for this year's Shakespeare Schools' Festival.

A Word from The Rectory Not forgotten

From The Vicar, The Revd Robert Thompson



I turned up in time to take what I imagined to be the first service of the day at a local crematorium only to find that I'd be beaten to it. There, in the otherwise deserted car park, was a black van bearing their company logo and its strapline 'Unattended Direct Cremation Funerals.'

There was a time when a van like this would be a routine sight at one end of the working day or

the other, and it was always a sad one. Unattended funerals were filled with pathos, the funerals of people so utterly alone in this world that not one person had come along to see them off, or the funerals of unborn babies who had never managed to arrive. These days, however, you'll find the black van parked in the crematorium rather a lot.

Unattended funerals are a growing phenomenon in the UK right now. Shiny adverts on daytime television trumpet their services. There's no need to negotiate the emotional minefield of grief nor yet suffer the bleak melancholy of attending a funeral when the black van can convey your loved one's mortal remains directly to your front door.

The service provided is, quite literally, the last word in convenience. I can't blame the funeral industry for this new undertaking; it's a logical extension for a consumer-driven operation. We live in the age of mobile ordering, drive-thru and pavement pick-up. Does it really represent an indignity to have granny's body shipped from a chilled warehouse to a crematorium and her ashes conveyed directly to you without any unnecessary detour to a chapel of rest and all that expensive ceremonial fuss?

Yes. Yes, it does.

Believe it or not (and admittedly, many people don't) it remains a tenet of Christian faith that

human beings are more than the warm wet biological machine our post-Christian culture tells us we are. We are created in the image of God. God counts every hair of our head. Our lives are written on the palm of God's hand. Our bodies, says the bible, are given to us in sacred trust – jars of clay honoured for the treasure of the soul they carry.

'Ashes to ashes, dust to dust.' Those words were never meant to sound like an after-thought, the last gleanings of our lives swept up and boxed up for home delivery at the moment of their extinction. And I don't think that many people want that for themselves either. Yes, granny may have said something about 'just chucking her over the garden hedge' when she died. She might have come back from the crematorium complaining about the funerals of friends, their naff taste in poetry or clichéd music, sung to their rest by Robbie Williams or Frank Sinatra.

But I'd be surprised if you were ever expected to take her at her word. What she meant to say is that she knew attending funerals is hard. Whichever way you spin it, funeral services mean death and grief and dirty great bills, emotional cost and financial cost, and we would all like to spare one another the price of that if we could.

But we can't avoid it. The end of a life, if we believe a life has meaning, is a dreadful event. The end of a life, if we believe a life has no meaning, is a more dreadful event still. It is hard to face it. But if we pluck up courage to stand in person and look on death at a funeral service, to feel the enormity of a single lost life, then that will be a witness to the value of all lives. Some people would even thank God for them.

There is little doubt in my mind that the way we commemorate the dead in this country is changing. Removing your hat for a passing hearse, giving way to a funeral cortège on its last solemn journey, bowing your head and keeping silence in respectful memory of the departed were once common customs, and we need to learn them again.

Standing at the Cenotaph in Hertford on Remembrance Sunday in recent years I've been

surprised by the number of people who showed by their behaviour that they didn't know what was required of them, fumbling with their phones and bearing mugs from the chain coffee shops for the two minutes' silence.

I'll grant them this though – at least they showed up. *With my prayers,*

The meaning of Advent

Advent is traditionally a time of candles, we light a candle at the beginning of each of the Sunday services in advent, culminating in the final candle on Christmas Day. Advent is often described as waiting for the light, that eager anticipation of that crowning last candle and the celebration of the babe in a manger, the new light to the world. The church celebrates many other events by lighting a candle. We have a decorated baptismal candle at the font with a smaller token candle given to the families, and around Christmas we have the Candlemas or Christingle which, of course, features a candle.

Almost all of the books of the Bible mention 'light'. From Genesis, 'Let there be light' to Jesus as recorded here from St John's Gospel. Jesus spoke to the people saying, "I am the light of the world. He that follows me will never live in darkness but will have the light that gives life".

Join us for just three Tuesday evenings during Advent: 3rd, 10th and 17th December at 8pm in Holy Trinity. We shall explore the notions that 'I am the light', 'Waiting for the light' and 'Walking in the light'. All are welcome even if you have time for just one evening.




